Four prospectors left Oregon for the mines in far off Alaska last April. Their names were Frank C. Young, R. C. Rose, A. Ingram and J. W. Sperry. They endured untold hardships on the headwaters of the Yukon, and Ingram and Young died from exposure and privations.

If Daniel Webster was now alive to see the four new states take their places in the Union, says the Globe Democrat, he would recall with some chagrin the fact that he objected to the organization of a territorial government for Oregon or the ground that said region was "so far off that it could never be governed by the United States" and that a delegate to Congress from there "could not reach Washington until a year after the expiration of his term." Mr. Webster was a wise man, but he had only a limited idea of the coming greatness of his country.

The Good Templars of Seattle have been all torn up over the question of religion, and the controversy threatens to disrupt the order. An attempt was made to drive out all members who do not believe in the church God as defined by the stricter members, and many members withdrew rather than submit to sectarian dominion. History teaches that men will fight to uphold their religion, and men will fight rather than to submit to a religious observance that is burdensome to them, and it which they are unbelievers. The most cruel and bloody wars have been waged by religious fanatics. The Constitution of the United States permits every person to worship God in a manner which best suits him. An attempt will be made at the next meeting of congress to change the Constitution by establishing a National Sabbath. That is the initial step towards uniting Church and State, and then farewell to American liberty and to peace within her borders.
