Governor White, of Montana, in his annual report, places the white population of that territory at 170,000 and the Indians at 15,000. The total wealth of Montana is given at \$150,000,000.

The anarchists held memorial services lately in Chicago, Kansas City, St. Louis and Denver, commemorating the hanging of the Chicago anarchist, but in each place the followers of the red flag failed to create any great amount of enthusiasm. This dangerous element is evidently dying out.

San Francisco is improving morally. The mayor recently vetoed an ordinance licensing prize-fighting and now a police judge has fined a Chinese tan-gam keeper \$250 and players at the game \$100 each. Hereafter police judges in the city have only imposed fines of \$40 and \$20 respectively for such offenses.

Colonel Bob Ingersoll likens the condition of the republican party after the late elections to the old lady who was bitten by a snake while out blackberrying. She has tended home as rapidly as possible and sympathizing neighbors gathered about, but the whimpering lady would not go into particulars. All she could be induced to say was: "I cannot show the place but I do know I'm bitten."

Those who denounce capitalists as vile enemies of humanity would scarcely refuse to assume a like position if they could. Joaquin Miller, who, after he went into Wall street and lost his little pile, used to rail at the rich and revile leading New York capitalists, has become a capitalist himself. Some years ago, he bought 200 acres of land near San Francisco, and now they have become valuable for town lots.

The constitution of North Dakota provides that no foreigner shall vote until two years after he has declared his intention of becoming a citizen, and the reading of the Declaration of Independence with ease shall be a test of the qualification of the voter. This is as it should be. There is no reason why the foreigner should not learn something of the government of his adopted country before taking a hand himself. Even the person born in the United States must be here twenty-one years before he can vote.

Gen. Benjamin F. Butler, of Boston, has been elected president of a Colorado gravel mining company. A man is never to old to learn, but the general starts in rather late in life to study the business of mining. That he doesn't understand the business now is evident from the statement which he made recently to a reporter: Without doubt our company has possession of a series of the largest placer mines in the country, and our object is to begin operations at once and to make them produce ore to their best capacity. The idea of a gravel or a placer mine producing "ore" is what paralyzes the practical miner.

As an illustration of how some persons can industriously fritter away their lives to no purpose, there is a man in Middleford, Me., who has whittled so industriously and skillfully for eleven years as to bring himself into notice. Among the products of his jack-knife are a violin case made of 2,937 pieces of wood of 106 different kinds; a yoke of oxen and a cart, put together in a glass jar with a small neck, and a great number of really well-made animals that would sell readily as toys. But this Maine genius will not part with any of his creations for love or money, and as he does nothing but whittle he is getting together a large and interesting collection.
