CRACKER COURTSHIP.

How "Pop" Won the Hand of an Industrious Widow.

Love-Making as Practiced in an Unknown Nook of Florida—The Way in Which Old Man Somers Presented His Case to Mrs. Legare.

Down in this unknown nook characters may be met who would delight those appreciative of the fresh and distinctive in human nature, writes a New York Tribune correspondent from Key Lake, Fla. Here in the desolate recesses of "the pine woods" are "crackers" who have never penetrated ten miles from the smoky chimneys in which they were born, and whom those who have been tormented by the fire-eating, clay walls and palmetto thicket of their existence. Here they have lived since the time, back in the '30s, when Osceola and his Seminoles were captured by the regulars or driven to the interior, pine-crooked and malaria swamps of the Everglades, indolence, ignorance, stolidness, courage and pride are their more prominent qualities.

Some miles back from this lake is a fertile tract of "high bromcock" land on which stands a particularly heavy and luxuriant growth of pine, magnolia and live-oak. In it are several clearings which were made some four or five decades since, by the first "crackers" who came to this section, at the time of their arrival a wild and virgin country, which foot of white man may not have trodden since Ponce de Leon ranged the peninsula in his quest for the fabled fountain of youth.

Three of the clearings are clustered closely together, one owned by the Widow Legare (pronounced Legree), one by "Pop" Somers and the third by "Uncle Billy" Thomas. Uncle Billy has contrived to pass six or seven years in a conversation with the widow, at the time of their arrival a wild and virgin country, which foot of white man may not have trodden since Ponce de Leon ranged the peninsula in his quest for the fabled fountain of youth.
