The House has passed a pension bill providing that in the case of dependent parents, it need only be shown that they are without other support than manual labor.

Several residents of the Umatilla reservation have presented claims to Special Agent Bishop at Pendleton. They are children of Hudson bay traders who suffered from Indian depredations in the year of 1855-56.

A remarkable man has been noted from L. A. Walker, living at Athens, failed and paid a few cents on the dollar, and his assignment was discharged. Going to Tacoma he made a fortune, and now returning to Athens he pays every cent in.

A Buffalo paper says Niagara river below the falls, is unusually low, and what is more singular the waters have been gradually falling for the past three or four years. It is still from 150 to 200 feet deep, however, and is not likely to dry up yet a while.

The experience of the two Dakotas and Montana ought to be a warning to Wyoming and Idaho to not be in a hurry to don the habiliments of statehood. The Dakotas are in a dreadful financial strait, while Montana has a contested election which she cannot settle.

George Chandler, assistant secretary of the Interior, gave a ruling that homesteaders who have pre-empted a smaller number of acres than they are allowed under the law, may make a second entry to complete the homestead of land remaining, before he has acquired all title to the first tract.

The United States Revised Statutes provide (Section 2, 166) that any alien of the age of 21 years and upwards, enlisted in the army of the United States, who may be honorably discharged, shall be admitted to become a citizen of the United States upon his petition, without any previous declaration of his intention to become such, and he shall not be required to prove more than one year's residence within the United States previous to such application.

The U. S. supreme court is giving a hearing to a case in which the State of North Carolina is sued by a citizen of that state to compel the payment of a certain special tax levied in 1869. The instrument of contract is set forth. The case involves the question of the right of a citizen to sue his state, and is sent up from the United States circuit court on a certificate of division of opinion. The state plants itself firmly on the proposition that it cannot be sued without its consent. The suit involves several million dollars, and was postponed until this time to secure a full bench, as the court is nearly equally divided on the issue raised.

The Hungarians living in the village of Troop, near Scranton, Pa., have substituted cat fleas for beef. For some time past the butchers in the valley have been unable to sell the Huns meat of any kind. An investigation showed that the foreigners were just as capable as ever of patronizing the butchers if they so desired. They were working steadily at the mines and making fair wages; but the Huns had found a cheaper way to get their meat. They have been trapping and stealing cats. Several parties watched the Huns disposing of the cats. The cats were first skinned, the intestines were removed and the carcass was then stuffed with rice and roasted.

The recent troubles about the receivers of deficient land offices has received the attention of Congress, and has resulted in an investigation being instituted into the methods of receiving public moneys by land officers. Several congressmen and senators have been rather anxious to know why some of the receivers recently appointed have not been confirmed. Senator Plumb, chairman of the committee on public lands, explained to all who enquired that Secretary Noble had sent his private secretary to Plumb asking that no more receivers be confirmed until the investigation now in progress shall be completed, and that some method be found to prevent repetitions of the defalcations that have recently been brought to light.

We see the poor Californians are having a potato famine. They can now eat lemons and oranges, you know.

The Senate committee on public buildings has recommended an appropriation of \$50,000 for a statue to Columbus to be placed in front of the capitol on Pennsylvania avenue, to be unveiled in 1892.

Sweden is perhaps the most protestant country in the world. Out of a population of 6,000,000, there are only 2,000 Roman Catholics, the remainder of the population belonging almost entirely to the Lutheran church.
