The West Shore of Feb. 8 has a fine supplement with pictures descriptive of flood scenes at Portland and Oregon City.

The bill appropriating \$75,000 for continuing the work on the jetty at the mouth of the Columbia has passed both houses of Congress.

Oregon City was a severe sufferer by the late flood, the damage being estimated at \$150,000. She is energetic and will soon have all her mills running again. It is stated that if the water had risen a couple of feet more the falls would have gone out.

An individual who has kept a record of 320 railroad accidents that have happened during the past year, finds that only thirteen of the entire number were beyond the control of human power to prevent. The rest were caused by drunkenness and carelessness.

Numerous burglaries have been committed in Seattle of late. The city seems to be infested by a gang of burglars who operate in a systematic and scientific manner. A few mornings ago, three stores were entered at about the same time and \$25 dollars in money and goods stolen.

The town of Burke, Idaho, in the Cour d'Alene mining district, has been nearly destroyed by a disastrous avalanche. Half the business houses are in ruins. Tuesday morning of last week, with scarcely a moment's warning, a tremendous mass of snow and rocks swept on the town. Five men were buried beneath the snow. Two were rescued, but the others are dead and their bodies have not been recovered.

A city election held at Salt Lake, recently, resulted in an overwhelming victory for the gentiles, the majority being estimated at 1200. It is not probable that the Mormons will ever again get control of the city, but the country south is largely Mormon and it will be years yet before the gentiles have a majority in the territory. It is a big feather for the gentiles though that they have captured the Mormon stronghold.

On the heights of Arlington, overlooking Washington City, resides two sisters, old maids, past 60, and worth over \$2,000,000 each. It seems that Mr. Corcoran, after buying up land from many rich people for a site for the Arlington hotel, wrote a polite note to the spinsters asking how much they would take for their rose garden, as he wanted to build on it an annex to his new hotel. A note came back signed by both sisters and saying: "We want to enlarge our rose garden. Will you sell the Arlington to us?"

In Paris it was discovered by the doctors that all persons, irrespective of sex who used ardent spirits habitually escaped the attacks of the la grippe, and temperance were the victims of the plague. Thereupon the doctors mended and prescribed the use of warm alcoholic drinks, with the result that 1,500 persons were arrested on the streets within three days for drunkenness. Of this number 1,200 plead guilty, but not with intent forethought and assigned as an excuse that they were following the directions of the doctors.

The German government is about to enforce stringent regulations to decrease immigration of its subjects to America. One of the propositions is to refuse passports to youths under 19 years of age, thus protecting the future military supply of the empire from depletion from immigration. Enforced detention in any country even though it be one's native land, savors too much of despotism to meet the requirements of personal liberty which are constantly growing in all civilized lands. There must be something wrong in the government of a nation, or in the opportunities that are afforded by its industries for the prosperity of the masses when the people see to leave it in such numbers as to weaken its numerical strength to an alarming degree. That ruler is wise who casts about him to see wherein this wrong lies, that he may if possible make it right to the end that his people may abide in his dominions, well content. Citizens by compulsion are an impossibility; subjects by compulsion as possible, but not desirable, even as material for soldiers in a standing army.
