Lively times are looked for between the two political parties in congress from this time on.

The Reno Gazette claims that the live stock outlook in Nevada is not as bad as has been reported.

The Portuguese recently took a look at England's ships and guns and counted her soldiers, and then concluded that discretion was the better part of valor. Superior force has to be respected.

The U. S. will soon have another candidate for Statehood. Oklahoma is talking strongly of trying to robe herself in Statehood's garb and it might be just as well to open the door for her if she be found eligible.

At a school meeting held in Pendleton Mrs. Starkweather was elected school clerk, vanquishing two male candidates. Here in Canyon the ladies are too timid to vote at a school meeting, much less run for office.

The money expended on roads, if properly applied, will save wear and depreciation of wagons. Many good horses also are annually killed or disabled by bad roads. A road cannot be made too good for travel, but of course this is not intended as a "hit" or anything of that sort.

Another victim of Christian science is the two-year old child of Thomas Simpson of Los Angeles, who died of cramps. The father refused the services of physicians, relying on prayer for the cure of the child. He will probably be arrested, when he will be given an opportunity to try the efficacy of prayer in delivering him from prison.

Of all the nonsensical and unjust bills introduced in Congress that one to prevent stock from grazing or pasturing on the public domain is about the worst of the lot. It provides that each head of stock grazing upon the lands of the United States shall be subject to a tax of \$1 a head per year, and this tax shall be a lien upon such stock so pastured. It makes no difference whether the lands are wanted for settlement or not, and it does not apply to stock that is driven or shipped across the land. How many bands of stock in this upper country are there which are not being pastured on government land? Were the owners compelled to pay a dollar for each cow or sheep that chews grass grown on the public domain the stock interest would be annihilated. Of course the measure will be defeated, as it originated in the skull of some eastern crank.

The House has just passed a bill permitting the authorities of the mint to change the dies used in the coinage of money without consulting Congress. As the Senate has twice passed such a bill it is now likely to become a law. The secretary of the treasury will probably be empowered to offer prizes to the artists of the country for superior designs. The present coins are the objects of great ridicule, but the News shop would be pleased to bear part of their ridicule and put up with their hideous appearance were the coins a little more plentiful. It is the idea of Dr. Leech of the treasury that there should be separate designs for the 10, 25 and 50 cent pieces. He objects to the slab-sided woman seated on a ball of cotton, as not representative of liberty or any other blessing. He also objects to the badly executed head of an Indian on the cent piece. The eagle he denounces as a "shunard." It seems that the artist who executed the design had so general a knowledge of the plumage of the bird of freedom that he gave him eight instead of seven tail feathers, a mistake that was only rectified after over two million pieces had been issued. The eagle seems to be, photographically speaking, a bad subject. We do not believe any self-respecting eagle in Oregon would acknowledge a resemblance in one of them on our money to himself. However, the likeness is no worse than those appearing on some foreign coins as authentic portraits of various denizens of the earth and sky, and whether they change the woman and eagle or not we will be pleased to receive silver coin on subscription.

Taxes in Turkey are calculated to be just high enough to prevent any poor man from getting enough money to leave the country on. The exact sum is left to the collector to determine, and he has power under the law to give any citizen fifty blows with a stick. Rhubarb and rugs come from Turkey, but that's about all the good there is in her.

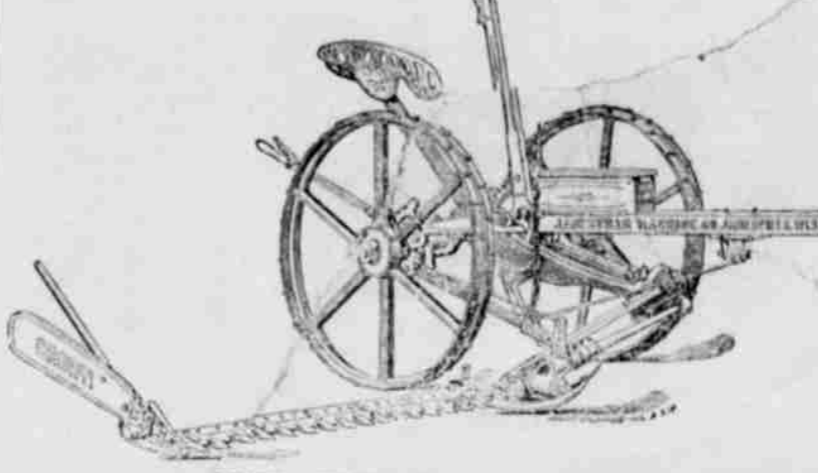
