

THE GRANT COUNTY NEWS.

May 1, 1890.

Since the great June fire Seattle's building inspector has issued permits for 1,845 buildings, at an estimated cost of \$6,693,452.

One who constructs a foundation for a building may enforce a mechanic's lien therefor, whether a building is erected thereon or not, according to the decision of the supreme court of Indiana.

On May 11, 1792, Captain Robert Gray entered the Columbia river in the ship Columbia, of Boston, and gave the name of his ship to the "Mighty Oregon." In 1892 a century will have elapsed and by that time, two years hence, the states of Oregon and Washington should celebrate the event in a manner befitting two powerful commonwealths.

A terrible plague has swept over a large section of southern Russia. Millions of field mice in such numbers as to be irresistible, have overrun those provinces, and are passing northward. They have ruined cultivated fields, completely gutted the granaries and wheat stacks, and killed and eaten several hundred dogs. They swim rivers and climb mountains, and there seems to be no way either of exterminating them or of arresting their progress.

Oregonian: A bill increasing the pension of the widow of General Milroy to \$75 a month has passed the United States senate. If a necessity existed for this increase it is all right. If, however, it is merely a compliment which will enable the beneficiary to add that sum monthly to the estate that she is laying up for her heirs, it is an injustice. This being a free country the sons of one man have the same chance that those of another have to take care of themselves and make their way in this world, and it is the interest of the individual as well as that of the nation that they be allowed to do it.

A Washington dispatch says: There is little chance for passage this session of the bill introduced by Mr. Hermann to pension the survivors of the Oregon Indian wars 1847-48 1855-56. Members of the pension committee of the house, to whom the bill was referred, have talked it over and decided that it should not be acted upon by them until after the other general pension bills have been disposed of. Bills to pension the soldiers and sailors of the Mexican war, and survivors of the Indian wars that took place in the South and Southwest between 1832 and 1842, are before the house, and it is believed that considerable opposition to the Oregon bill would be manifested should an attempt be made to call it up for discussion and passage before the other bills referred to have been taken up.

The supreme court of the United States rendered an important decision in the case of Neagle, who was in custody for killing Terry, who attempted the life of Judge Field. The court directed the release of Neagle on habeas corpus on the ground that he was in custody for an act done "in pursuance of the laws of the United States," and that under the terms of habeas corpus act he was entitled to his release. The court held that in traveling to hold circuits Justice Field was as much in the discharge of a duty imposed upon him by law as he was while sitting in court and trying causes, and entitled to all the protection under those circumstances which the law could give him. The court said that it did not suppose that any special act of congress exists which in express terms authorized marshals or deputy marshals to act as a body guard to the justices while on their circuits, but in view of the constitution any obligation fairly and properly inferable from that instrument, or any duty of the marshal to be derived from the general scope of his duties, comes within the provision of the habeas corpus act directing the release of persons who are in custody for an act done "in pursuance of the laws of the United States."

It would, says the opinion, be a great reproach to the system of government of the United States, declared to be within its sphere sovereign and supreme, if there is to be found within the domain of its powers no means of protecting the judges in the discharge of their duties from the malice and hatred of those upon whom its judgment may operate unfavorably.

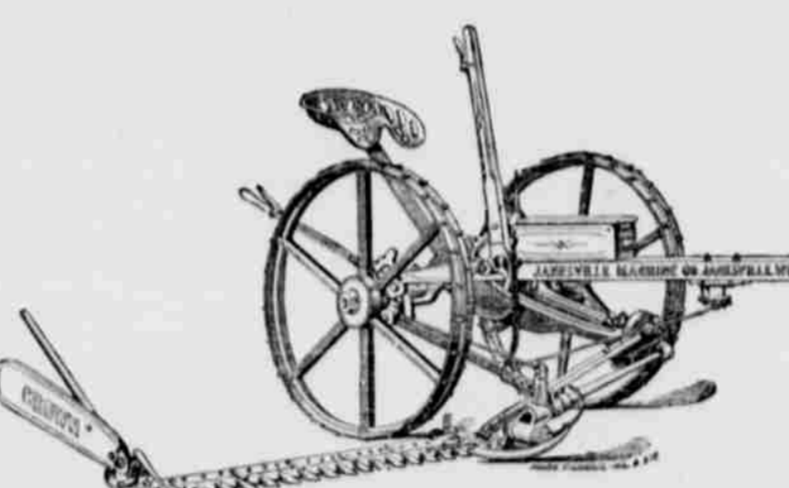
