AMAZED THE HEARERS.

Two Ministerial Plagiarists Preach the

Two village newspapers up this way are exchanging stories of their experi-ences in reporting plagfarized sermons, says a Middletown correspondent of the New York Sun. The Gardiner Weekly set out by telling of a church in that village whose pulpit is supplied by two preachers from reighboring towns on alternate Sundays. The other Sunday Pastor A. filled the pulpit and preached an unusually brilliant and effective sermon. The Fate of the Buffalo.

Twensy years ago there roamed over the plains and mountains of the far West nearly 8,000,000 buffaloes. Today there are less than 500 head of the animals in existence. There are but eighty-five head of wild buffaloes, 304 alive in captivity, and about 200 under the protection of the Government in Yellowstone Park. There is also said to be about 550 head in the British possessions, Borth of Montana, but this is rumor. Of the righty-five head of wild buffaloes which are known to exist, twenty-five are in Texas, twenty in Colorado, twenty-six in Wyoming, ten in Mon-tana and four in Dakota.
