REMARKABLE WINTERS.

The winter of 1889-90 has been remarkable for its mildness. December, January and February, the three winter months, have had no parallel in recent years. However, their counterpart is to be found in the year 1816, which is known as "a year without a summer."

There has been so much speculation as to the causes which have produced these changes, that it is not necessary to refer to them. They are simply the opinions of men more or less skilled in noting and explaining atmospheric and physical changes. In 1816, from the best statistics obtainable, January and February were mild, and March was cold. Ice formed in May an inch thick. June was the coldest ever known in New York and the eastern states, frost and ice were common. Almost every green thing was killed. Snow fell to the depth of ten inches in Vermont; seven inches in Maine; three inches in the interior of New York and Massachusetts. The wind blew steadily from the north with but slight interruption during the season. On June 17 a heavy snow fell in the New England states and the cold was intense. At that time, as with the present, the people encountering this peculiar weather and atmospheric conditions, imagined that the sun was cooling off. July was accompanied with frost and ice. The corn crop was almost entirely destroyed. August was even more cheerless, and ice during this month, formed one-half inch thick. As a result, the corn crop was a total failure, and it had to be cut down to make fodder. Almost everything green in this country, as well as in Europe, was destroyed. On June 30 snow fell within forty miles of London, England. Corn, in the spring of 1817, sold for seedling purpose at from \$4 to \$5 a bushel.

September of this year was the pleasantest weather of the season for the first two weeks, but later in the month ice formed an inch thick. November was cold and snowy, December was comfortable and the winter following was mild.

As a result of this spring and summer, flour was about \$13 per barrel and wheat in England was 10 shillings per quarter. While we do not apprehend any such spring or summer as that of 1816, yet we simply give these facts so serve as an illustration that such conditions did not exist and that this is not the first time that we have had a remarkable winter or spring.—Ex.

The Philadelphia board of health have recommended citizens of that place to boil both milk and water twenty minutes before drinking them. If Philadelphia milk is like that supplied to most cities, it will be sufficient to boil the water alone.

Alaska wants to have a delegate in congress, and be placed on an equal footing with the other territories. The request ought to be granted. Alaska pays to the United States government every year enough money to cover the interest of her purchase money. She pays it from the seal fisheries, and it is a larger sum than any of the other territories pay to the government or ever did pay.
