It is not so difficult to get up a boom as to sustain it for any length of time.

The Louisiana lottery company has doubled its offer to the State and now offers one million dollars per annum for the privilege of maintaining the lottery.

The quickest time ever made around the globe was made by George Francis Train who arrived in Tacoma last week having traveled around the earth in sixty-two days.

The new Chancellor of Germany is about to submit a proposition imposing a tax on all Germans ineligible for service in the army, and upon German citizens who reside abroad.

The poor farmers of South Dakota are having a customary hard time of it. As soon as they had put their seed in the ground a zephyr whooped along and scattered it abroad for fifty miles or more.

Assistant Postmaster General Clarkson says, "the government of the United States is a political, not a business machine." Any one who keeps posted in the workings of Congress could have stated as wisely.

Assistant Land Commissioner Stone has rendered a decision in which he holds that a soldier who makes a filing under the homestead law of 1872, but who fails to make settlement thereon within the six months, does not forfeit his right to the land, unless an adverse claim intervenes prior to the date on which he asked settlement.

The school book clique will use its utmost power to re-elect School Supt. McElroy. What is in the interest of that ring is at the expense of the people who have to foot the bills. Elect McElroy and have another change in school books as soon as he can get around to saddle the burden upon you. The cost of this imposition is considerable to the voters and taxpayers of Oregon.

E. J. Kaiser, editor of the Ashland Record, has been released by the supreme court from paying a fine of \$50 for criticising the acts of the circuit court over which Judge Webster presided. When the press has not the moral as well as the legal right to call public attention to any judicial acts it believes to be wrong, it is time to place this country under the despotic rule of the Czar of Russia.

An Oregonian dispatch says an important change has been made in the homestead and pre-emption laws by the senate committee on public lands. The claimant cannot commute unless he has occupied the land thirty months instead of six, as provided for under the present laws. This will prevent a large amount of land from being taken and commuted in six months for speculative purposes.

A short time ago we intended publishing the Ten Commandments but feared some subscriber would take them as a personal fling. The other day a Kentucky paper published them and created a decided sensation. The people there thought it was the new constitution of the Republic of Brazil, and excitement and comment ran very high, and special editions had to be run off to supply the demand for such news.

If the Union Pacific is backing the Baker-Sumpter railroad it will miss a golden opportunity if it does not extend the line to the headwaters of the John Day and then down towards The Dalles. There is a probability of Hunt building a road from The Dalles south, and if he does one branch will undoubtedly tap the rich section of country on the upper John Day unless some other company invades its territory.

Several Americans residing in Lower California recently conspired with an English company doing business on the peninsula, their object being to seize by force that portion of Mexico, set up an independent republic and afterwards become attached to the United States. The Mexican government got onto the scheme and stopped further proceedings, and in all probability will demand of our government that the conspirators be punished.

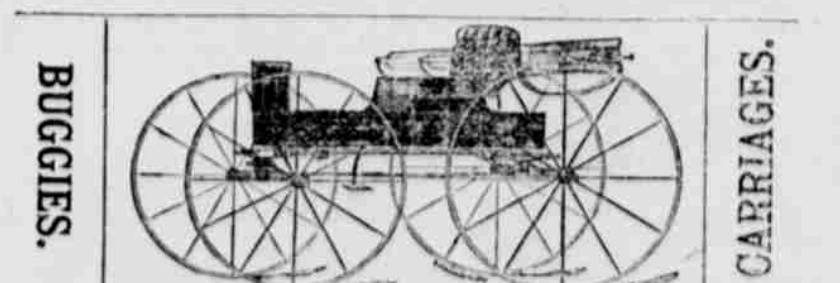

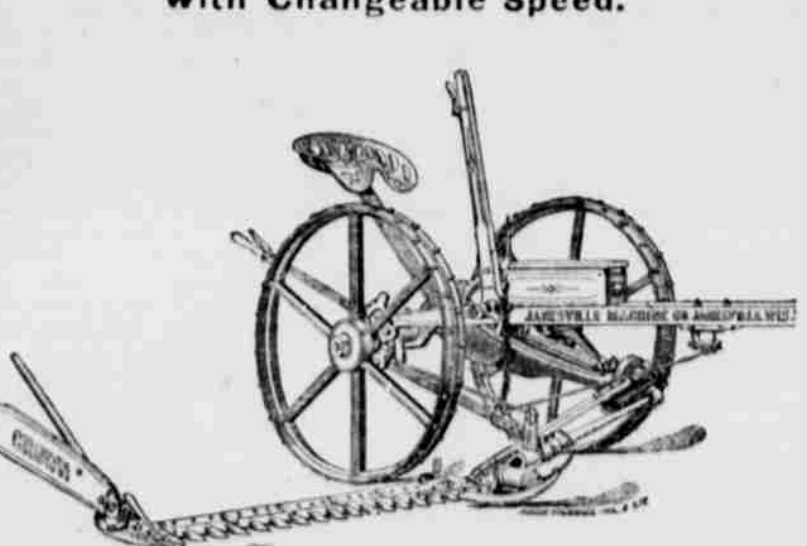
