Reminiscences of Colorow.

BY THE HON. WOLFE LONDONER.

I first saw Colorow the famous, or rather infamous Ute Chief in 1860. I was running a grocery store at Canon City, Colorado, where he used to come to trade. He always had four or five wives with him, and a lot of outcasts from the Ute tribe. Although by birth Colorow was the King of the tribe, they never had much use for him. He and his squaws, together with two or three dogs, used to sleep in my store at night, while the rest of the gang had to sleep on the ground outside. He presented me with a beautiful buffalo robe one time, and came back later in the day and did the Injun act we used to hear about in our childhood days. In those times we were all afraid of the Indians, and I got the robe for him in double quick time.

We had just started a branch store in California gulch, now Leadville, which was then a paradise for the gold digger, and I frequently met Colorow on the way to and from Canon City—while carrying goods from one place to the other. The gulch had in 1860 a population of about 10,000, most of whom were miners who were away from the town, working their claims in day time. I ran a combination grocery and drug store, in partnership with Doctor Fouts.

I was clerk and recorder and clerk of the district court also. One day my wife and I were alone in the place, when a dark form stood in the doorway, which I recognized as belonging to Colorow. He was a terrible eater and he strutted into the place followed by four squaws and two dogs.

"Eat now!" he said pointing to his stomach.

"Not now," I replied "by and by."

"Eat right away," he grunted. I saw him fingering a hatchet and concluded that I wanted to eat right away, too. All we had in the house was some bean soup and a ham bone. He sat down at the head of the table and his squaws around him. He put his hands in the soup pot and scooped out the bean porridge with his fingers, grunting all the time and acting like a boy. The squaws didn't get much nor the dogs either. After he had eaten an enormous quantity he pointed to my wife and said, "heap nice squaw." In about an hour afterwards he came back holding his hands over his stomach.

"Heap sick," he grunted "want medicine."

I told him I didn't know anything about medicine, when he whipped out his hatchet and hit the desk such a rap that the ink bottle splattered me all over with its contents. I was frightened, and turning around, saw a jar of Epsom salts standing behind him on a shelf. I went to the back of the store and mixed a big tin cup full of the stuff and gave it to him. He went away, and the next day a wonderful looking object came limping into the shop when Fouts was there. I told him what I had given Colorow, and Fouts said that it was a wonder he didn't die. I told Fouts about Colorow dining with me the day previous, and he said he had eaten everything in his house, too, the same day, which gluttony probably made him sick. We didn't wait the old devil to die in the store, so we fixed him up and made a bed for him. He stayed two or three days, and when he went away he gave me a roll of buckskin and his favorite dog, Bonito, well named, too, for it was without exception the thinnest-looking cur I have ever seen. I didn't want the beast, but kept it until it killed itself, by overgorging, I think.
