Election day is an event which may almost be called momentous. It is one at which time every citizen has a sovereign right to express his convictions at the polls.

President Harrison has sent a special message to congress calling attention to the recommendation of the Pan-American congress for a survey of the proposed grand trans-continental railway, connecting North and South America, and transmitting a letter to secretary Blaine giving details of the proposed work and asking that congress appropriate \$65,000, which is the amount estimated as the share of the United States in the cost of the preliminary surveys to determine the best and most economical route for the railway.

Senator Stanford got tired waiting for the senate committee on finance to act on the resolution he introduced some time ago instructing that committee to inquire and report upon the feasibility of the government's loaning the farmers money at a low rate of interest, taking mortgages on real estate as security, and has introduced a bill providing that the treasury shall loan upon any unincumbered agricultural land one half its assessed value at 2 per cent. interest. The bill, although strongly favored by many thoughtful people, will probably meet the fate of the senator's resolution, and never be reported back to the senate. Stanford is a slick one; he owns immense tracts of land, and would like to get a lot of cheap loans from the government for purposes of speculation.

A bill has been introduced into congress providing that "any person who shall disgrace the national flag, either by printing on said flag, or attaching to the same or otherwise any advertisement for public display, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$50 or imprisoned not less than thirty days or both."

Senator Blair has introduced one good resolution in congress. It provides for an amendment to the constitution providing that it shall be unlawful for either the United States or individual states to authorize the establishment or maintenance of lotteries or any distribution of prizes by chance.

The United States supreme court has handed down a decision affirming the constitutionality of the anti-polygamy law of Utah, and one holding that no state has a right to make laws interfering with commerce between states.
