Boston has made arrangements for an overflowing treasury. A new ordinance imposes a fine of \$20 for each use of profane language on the street.

We would like to suggest that those people who are always hitting at the newspapers are hitting at them, just take a look through the bible. We fancy they will see even there a gentle knock.

W. A. Crandall, chairman of the democratic state central committee, has written a letter to State Senator Foster, leader of the anti-lottery movement in the legislature, suggesting that the question of a lottery amendment to the constitution be submitted to a primary election throughout the state, at which only whites shall be permitted to vote.

One of the most unique memorials ever proposed for a dead hero is now being discussed at Middlesborough, Ky. It consists of the erection of a monument by Grand Army men and ex-Confederate soldiers, acting in unison, to their respective leaders in the civil war—Grant and Lee—on two mountain peaks overlooking Cumberland Gap.

Never was retribution more swift than that which overtook a would-be-murderer. Michael F. Ney, aged 59 years, a veteran of the late war, lived with his wife, aged 45, in Boston. They were poor but in comfortable circumstances, as both were hard workers. Lately the husband had been much dissipated, and threatened his wife's life, and she, in her rage determined to take him. Mrs. Ney got some strychnine, and making two glasses of lemonade she poisoned one of them. Not liking the taste, he put his down, accidentally changing the relative positions of the two tumblers, and when he picked it up, got hers instead, and she took the fatal drink. They drank to each other's health, and in twenty minutes she died in intense agony.

The General Land Office has issued the following warning to careless starters of timber fires: The attention of the public is called to the fact that large quantities of the timber is annually destroyed by forest fires which, in many cases, originate through the carelessness of hunting, prospecting and other camping parties; while in some instances they may occur through design. I take this method of warning all persons that, hereafter, the cause and the origin of all forest fires will be closely investigated, and where the fire is ascertained to have originated through either carelessness or design, the parties implicated will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. White persons may be prosecuted if proven guilty, but we are safe in saying that the dirty swishes can burn Eastern Oregon timber as usual, and no action will be taken against them. The settlers, however, can take the matter into their own hands.

A Chinese detective is in Albuquerque, New Mexico. His mission is to arrest a Chinaman who four years ago committed murder in China, the details of which were the most blood-curdling and horrible ever known in the criminal history of the celestial empire. The murderer's name is Foo Choo. He was enamored with a Chinese maiden named Nankeen Pan Yan. Her father objected to the attentions of Foo Choo and insisted on Nankeen marrying another. Nankeen demurred, however, but the parent persisted and Nankeen became a bride. The ceremony was performed with all the pomp and display of a well-to-do Chinese family. Foo Choo stole into the compartments during the night, and after blinding and gagging his victims, deliberately murdered them by inches. He first cut off the fingers of the bride's hands; then her toes; then dismembered her body. The groom was treated to a like fate and then the murderer fled. His crime was not discovered until three days afterwards. A search was immediately made for Foo, who was suspected of the crime, but he had effected his escape, going from China to Australia. The emperor offered a large reward for his capture, and during the past three years the detective has been hunting him.

Two baseball clubs composed of women played a game at Danville, Ill., before 200 people. The United States Attorney swore out a warrant for their arrest for disturbing the peace. The pitchers must have broke some windows or something in the town.

Justice Lamar tells Washington correspondent he thinks Mississippi will eventually be a negro state and that the whites would be forced to emigrate. He is so confident of this that he is anxious to sell his plantation in Mississippi, consisting of about five hundred acres of the finest lands in that state, and having on it forty-seven registered cows and a number of fine horses. Justice Lamar has a magnificent homestead there and his lands are under the best of cultivation. He offers the whole for much less than it is worth, and he says he has no desire to have any of his friends to remain in Mississippi.

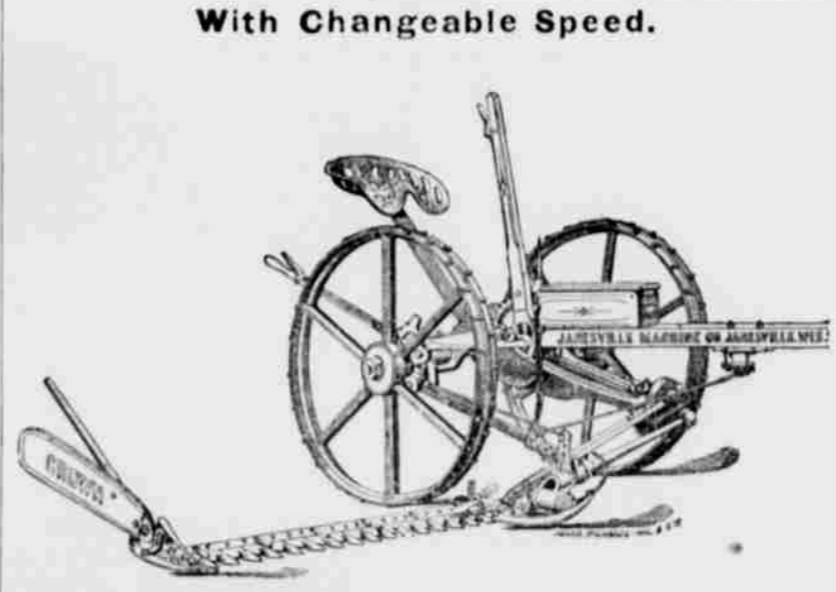

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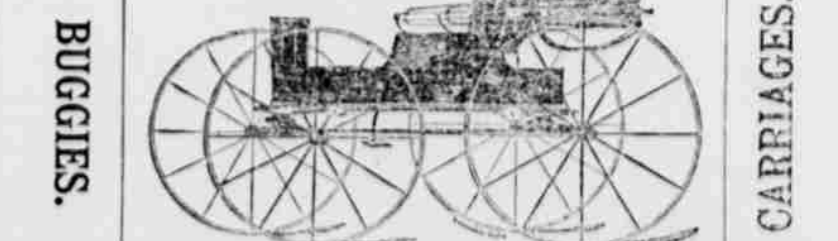
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
