It is estimated that California and Nevada have sold \$1,000,000 worth of beef to Oregon and Washington this year.

The Spanish cabinet has decided to punish the local officers in the cholera stricken district of Spain for concealing the extent of the cholera.

Panthers are numerous about Folsom, California. One was recently killed in a garden, while another chased two men into town last week.

California will spend a million dollars in preparing a grand exhibition of her products at the World's Fair at Chicago, and we hope Oregon will have a good set of samples there.

The week ending August 4th, is to be honored by the taking off of Kemmler, the New York murderer, by the means of the dealing electric current. His third and probably last sentence ends that matter up to date, and he will then be "electrocuted" unless some more technical lawyer gets up a further plea to postpone the affair to a later date.

Speaking of the tax laws of Oregon, the Eugene Register very pertinently says: "There is something radically wrong in the tax law of Oregon, that places a penalty on the man that is prompt in paying his just taxes and awards a premium to delinquent. At the present time we are informed that the amount of tax due and delinquent in Lane county is \$25,000, and no interest accruing against the delinquent, who is using money justly due the county, for which he don't pay a cent, and if he is called upon for payment can laugh at the collector. Those who pay taxes promptly are subject to paying the interest charges against the county, resulting from the non-payment of the heavy delinquent list. It is a subject that is unpleasant to notice, were it not that justice demands that the evil should be remedied.

Grant county wool is considerably lighter and free from sand and dirt than Crook county wool, but the following from the Prineville Review might be equally applicable to this county: "Crook county ought to have a wool-scouring and sorting establishment, and probably will have as soon as a railroad is built through the county. But now it is most needed, when the cost of transportation is great and wool growers are forced to pay high rates for hauling to market the dirt their wool contains. The wool of this country loses on an average nearly one-half its weight by scouring, and the cost of shipping the dirt there is in the wool to The Dalles one year would almost pay for an establishment sufficient to scour all the wool raised in the county. Suppose the county produces two million lbs. of wool annually, and that half this weight is removed by scouring, the freight on this from Prineville to The Dalles at one cent a pound would amount to \$10,000. Here is an opportunity for some of our local capitalists to make a paying investment, and one that would keep in the county a vast amount of money that is annually sent abroad.

Senator Allison, who is chairman of the Senate committee on appropriations, has just made a statement which cannot fail to have an important effect upon several bills now pending in congress. Mr. Allison says the appropriation for the present fiscal year make a total of \$160,000,000, while the estimated receipts, including those from the postoffice department are only \$450,000,000. This statement, which does not include any appropriation for the new dependent pension law, has opened the eyes of the party leaders to the fact that it is necessary to call a halt on appropriations. It is thought that this showing will be certain to defeat the River and Harbor and the Fortification bills, and it will unquestionably put the ship subsidy bills, which have already passed the senate, in jeopardy. And that is not all. It has caused the sugar men to begin a fresh fight in the hope that the senate may decide to restore the duty on sugar in the tariff bill. Quite a respectable number of senators have been in favor of doing it anyway, and now that it can be shown that the government needs the revenue thus raised, there is no telling what the outcome may be.

Oregon should have a creditable exhibition and representation at the World's Fair at Chicago. It will take money and effort to do it, and organization should be the first thing in order.

Two prominent Hebrews of Berlin, Dr. Abel and District Rabbi Morgenthau, are on trial before the synagogue committee, on a charge of smoking cigars on Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath.

Senator Mitchell has made application for an increase in the salary of the clerks at the United States Land office at The Dalles, Or., and also for an additional clerk in that office. The matter is under consideration.

Two men in Alabama recently fought a duel with hatchets, one chopped the other until, like the hissoctie cherry tree, he fell to the ground and died. But the chopper, unlike his predecessor, did not stand his trial, but fled.

The correspondence between the State Department and Great Britain on the Behring's Sea controversy, which the senate by resolution has called for, is said to be of such a nature that Mr. Harrison will decline to make a portion of it public until some conclusion is reached in the negotiations now going on.

That was an extraordinary upsettle in Louisiana. The legislature had determined that the Louisiana Lottery was all right and it passed a bill to that effect. The governor vetoed it, whereupon the legislature prepared to re-pass it over the governor's veto, but the sudden illness of a man, whose name, strange to say, was Smith, blocked the game. Smith died, and there they are. One vote short. If that's not odd, what is?

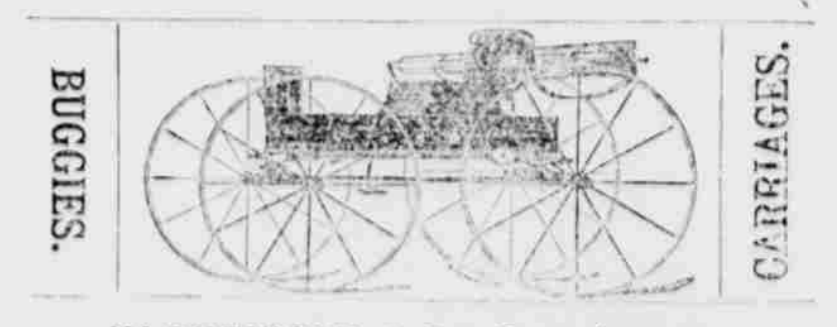
