Mrs. General Grant says she first met the general in 1844, and they were married in 1848. She has many of the letters written by him during the days of their courtship, and while she regards these in their entirety as too sacred for the public eye, she will make extracts from them for her book of reminiscences of her famous husband.

A soldier sent five dollars to General Beauregard, of the Louisiana lottery, and told him to send him in return a winning ticket, saying that when he came out of army he had scarcely enough clothes to cover his nakedness. The General replied: "My dear sir, I send you a ticket. I hope that it will win the prize. I also offer you this advice. If you stick to the Louisiana lottery you will not have clothes enough to wad a shotgun."

Capt. A. P. Ankeny, an old and respected citizen of Oregon, and who was former owner of the New Market theatre block in Portland, was adjudged insane last week by the authorities of Jackson county, and has been placed in the insane asylum at Salem. Mr. Ankeny is 78 years old and has been following the occupation of a miner in Southern Oregon for a few years past. The cause of his insanity is due to cerebral hemorrhage followed by softening.

Some genius has made a calculation showing that every column in a newspaper contains from twelve to twenty thousand distinct pieces of metal, displacement of any one of which will cause a blunder or typographical error. And yet some people lay claim to particular smartness if they can discover an error in a newspaper. When some find a word with a letter misplaced, they are sure they could spell that word right, and they are happy for a whole day, and go around to the neighbors and show them the word that is spelled wrong.

A county newspaper is a necessity to the welfare of the county in which it labors, says an exchange, but for the amount of good it does it is the poorest paid labor of all the industrial institutions in the county. Every church entertainment, every civic society, every literary society, ministerial notice, every organization of what ever name or nature expects the local paper to give them space free of charge, seeming to forget that the manager has to pay cash for his paper, ink, type, and pay his help to "set it up" and stand the wear and tear of the press and fixtures, besides write local notices of each and make flattering comments of the results. And for all this he gets more curses than blessings, and when he asks those parties to subscribe for his paper, in a majority of cases they shrug up their shoulders and say they are too poor to take his paper, or if they subscribe they let their subscription run for years. In many cases they leave the county for parts unknown, and soon the editor gets a card from the postmaster notifying him that the paper is not taken from the office; cause, left the country. These cases are too frequent and leave an aching void in the manager's account.

It is reported that the inhabitants of fishing villages along the coast of Newfoundland are dying by the hundreds of an unknown epidemic. Nothing has so far proved a cure, nor has an alleviative been found, and the disease marches from house to house, victim to victim, with nothing to stay its awful progress. The first reports of the epidemic was reported about two weeks ago, on the arrival of the regular fortnightly coasting steamer, which calls at several of the important fishing stations on the French shore. The captain reported to the health authorities that while touching at La Poile, he was informed that a strange epidemic had broken out in Coachman's cove. The people thought it a virulent type of diphtheria called "black throat." As there was no regular physician on the coast, nothing definite was known except that not a single person so far attacked had recovered. Other peculiar features were that many cases of death ensued in thirty-six hours after the disease appeared, and rapid purification set in the moment life left the body. The population of Coachman's cove is but little over 150, yet nearly half that number have died since the first outbreak. It has also broken out in many other villages.

The final returns of the police-censuses make the population of Cleveland 269,000.

The memory of England's grand old man, Gladstone, is said to be rapidly fading and his faculties are not nearly so keen and bright as they were only a short time ago. He is almost 81 years old now, and the certainty of his early retirement from public life becomes more evident every day.

Postmaster General Wainmaker has made a contract for stamped envelopes and newspaper wrappers for the next four years that will save the country nearly half a million dollars. Such strokes of public economy as this will be forgotten in the regular democratic cry for "reform" and the wholesale charges of republican extravagance that form the stock in trade of democratic campaign material in presidential years. —Oregonian.
