

THE GRANT COUNTY NEWS.

September 18, 1890.

Republicans in Michigan are not dwelling together in harmony, and their outlook for the state election next month does not appear to be flattering, and they are all broke up because of a fight for governor in the convention.

About the first job the next legislature will be called upon to tackle will be the election of a U. S. Senator. Mitchell, of course, will make a strong pull for reelection, and it is evident there will be a number of other candidates in the field.

They are getting right at the root of the evil in New York, and now since the first of this month it is unlawful for any "child actually or apparently under sixteen years of age" to "smoke or in any way use any cigar, cigarette or tobacco in any form whatever in any public street, place or resort."

The county commissioners of Polk county pledged themselves before election to not build a new court house, and they are staying with their pledge right along. A citizen of Polk county offers to donate \$30,000 towards building a new court house, and still they are unmoved. These are men of fixed determination.

At Walla Walla justice is not always tempered with patience. Sam Murphy was arrested there the other day for stealing, and sent to jail. When the sentence was pronounced Murphy began cursing the sheriff. The sheriff then commenced to beat Murphy. Murphy was rescued and taken to jail, and while the police officer was looking for the sheriff the prisoner slid out and has not yet been captured.

In pursuance of the project for the establishment of an international railroad to connect the countries of North and South America the Secretary of State some time ago issued invitations to the other American republics to appoint commissioners to superintend the survey for the route. It was intended to have the commissioners meet in Washington in October for the purpose of organizing and beginning work. According to advices from Washington a sufficient number of responses to the invitation have been received to give ground for the expectation that the commission will be largely attended and do much preliminary work towards furthering plans for this international railway.

North Idaho has an Indian scare in the country claimed by the Nez Perce tribe before the Indian war of 1877. After the capture of the Nez Perces under Chief Joseph and their exile to Indian territory they were permitted to return to the reservation near Lewiston. The tribes have been sullen and discontented since their return and have been heard to vow vengeance at some time on the whites, and the people of that vicinity are alarmed at their talk and warlike demonstrations. Squaws tell the settlers to be careful or the warriors will sweep漫ue. Setters are arming and are ready to hurl back the attempts of the savages to murder families or burn and pillage homes, and a detachment of cavalry has been dispatched from Ft. Boise to the scene of the scare.

Through the united effort of their citizens Portland and Salem secured a new census enumeration, and the figures show for Portland a gain of 14,257 over the June count, or a gain of 24 per cent. Salem gained 22 per cent, over the old count. The population of Portland and Multnomah county is now given at 75,257, while at present the population of the state stands at about 305,000. This gain in the two principal cities indicates for the state, if the balance of the state was properly enumerated and gained in proportion, a population of 375,000—the estimated population based on the number of votes cast at last election. The counties of Eastern Oregon should be correctly enumerated in order to maintain their just representation in the legislature, to say nothing of the credit it would be to our state to have her population anywhere near correctly given. Grant county, however, has no great kick to make against her enumerators, but Harney and every other county has reason to complain of her count. Oregon ought to have a re-count, and will doubtless be able to secure it.


