Corn and oats are now selling in the Chicago market at nearly double the prices obtained last February.

Mt. Hood was discovered by Lieut. Broughton, R. N., in 1792, and named for Lord Hood. Fremont found it in volcanic eruption in 1843.

The editor of the Boston Herald protests because an Ohio court fined a man \$2000 for kissing a woman against her will, while an Illinois court fined a man \$15 for a similar offense.

They are making excellent wool out of the fiber of the fir tree by means of electricity. The time is now come when the lamb may as well lie down with the lion.

The report of the director of the mint shows that the United States government has issued more coin this year than any year before. The prosperity of the country can be partially attributed to this fact.

More than 200 census enumerators have died since the completion of their work in June last. It is more than probable that some will survive till they are paid off.

The chlorination process for the extraction of gold from its ores has been greatly improved in recent years, and now promises to be adapted to the treatment of low grade, non-concentratable ores.

The democrats have the largest majority in the next congress ever had by any party in this country. The republicans had 100 majority in the forty-third congress, under Grant. The democrats controlled the forty-fourth and forty-fifth by 77 and 74 respectively. This time they will have a majority of at least 154.

Walla Walla is infested by burglars and incendiaries, and the Indians arrested there some time ago threaten to destroy the city within fifty days. The people of this country may as well make up their minds that they will have to make a general clean up of Indians within the next twelve months. This new Messianic business means trouble.

The new Indian Messiah says that all the dead Indians are to be resurrected, and Sitting Bull says he will take the field as soon as his braves come back. If Sitting Bull's followers do not go on the warpath until all the dead Indians are resurrected, there will be no outrages to report. Dead Indians are good Indians, and they greatly outnumber the living. — E. O.

A British newspaper admonishes English farmers to consider well before sowing wheat, unless assured of a return of \$30 an acre. The American agriculturist considers himself blessed beyond measure with less than half this result; and if growing wheat in England is so unprofitable at one's figure as to receive discouragement from such a source, then the farmers of the United States may well hope for better times and more remunerative prices.

Wiggins the Canadian weather prophet, says that the end of the world is several billions of years away. This, if true, would present a hopeless future to adventurists and other persons who are always looking for the heavens to pass away like a parchment scroll, and fill them with unutterable despair. But Wiggins is so reliably wrong in all of his prophecies that they will take no stock in him and continue to indulge in their pleasurable anticipations of an early end of the world as before. And they will continue as before, to lay up the perishable treasures of this earth, and be careful that their neighbors do not have the advantage in a horse trade.

Victory has its troubles, too. Already there are evidences that the fight among the democrats for the Speakership of the next House is to be long, stubborn and bitter. At the start there are half a dozen candidates. Mills thinks the removal of Carlisle to the Senate and the death of Randall and Cox gives him a mortgage on the Speakership, but his claims will be hotly disputed by those who believe themselves better qualified to wield the Speaker's gavel than the Texan. Among them are Crisp of Georgia, who proved himself an able parliamentarian during the last session; McMillan of Tennessee; Bynum of Indiana, Springer of Illinois, and Breckenridge of Kentucky.

The Surest Way of Being Ready for Them is to Meet Small Ones Calmly.  
The knowledge of what to do in case of sudden calamity does not generally come on the spur of the moment or by inspiration—it is already in store and waiting a summons into action. Those who keep their eyes and ears open very readily learn what is best to be done in case of fire, or burning, or sunstroke, or a broken limb, or a fainting fit, or a severe cut, or sudden and severe illness, until professional assistance can be brought by their aid. A commonplace book in which modes of treatment in various maladies and accidents are noted down is very useful in helping one to remember what to do.

The surest way of being ready for the great emergencies of life is to meet all its small ones not only with calmness, but with a masterful spirit, resolved to turn defeat and disaster, however trifling, to good account, by learning from them the secret of victory. "To be weak is miserable doing or suffering," and they who cultivate weakness, by refusing to use even the smallest means of overcoming obstacles in their way, cultivate misery. Those unhappy souls, when called upon to confront sudden and terrible emergencies, cringe and faint and know not which way to turn, while those who with fearless courage and indomitable will fight the lesser battles of life, are strengthened thereby for those mightier conflicts that call out all their skill and resources, and make their saviors and benefactors to their associates in trouble.

Young mothers envy the untroubled composure observed in elderly women who have reared large families of children, and who have learned that broken bones will heal, that bruises get well, that there are ways of managing and preventing disease, and that it is always best to keep possession of one's wits. "All things come alike to all," and as Milton says of the affliction which at once darkened and brightened his life: "It is not so wretched to be blind as it is not to be capable of enduring blindness. But why should I not endure a misfortune which it behooves every one to be prepared to endure if it should happen, which may in the common course of things happen to every man, and which has been known to happen to the most distinguished and virtuous persons in history." — N.
