Italian socialists are establishing colonies in Brazil, and are encouraged by the government.

The act passed at the last session of congress, imposing additional restrictions on immigration, has gone into operation.

An Indianapolis church member who subscribed to a church building fund attempted to wriggle out of it by claiming that the contract was illegal, as it was made on Sunday; but the court decided he must pay up.

The department of state has been informed of a series of attempts to swindle prominent Americans by some rascal in Spain, who always relates the same story of buried treasure, which may be secured by advancing a small sum.

A man in Malton, Nev., tipped a barrel of whiskey into a natural spring which flowed on his premises, and invited a number of ranchmen to come and see it. He sold the spring next day for \$10,000 and skipped the state. This is a hint to some of the boom towns.

The people of Greenhorn, Granite, Robinsonville and other places are asking Baker City to aid them in the construction of a wagon road that will enable them to do their trading in Baker City. There is not another city the size of this place in the state where an appeal of that kind would be allowed to go unanswered twenty-four hours.—Blade.

A WAR WITH ITALY.

Italy Indignant at the Slow Movements of Justice.

FEARS OF HOSTILITIES LAUGHED AT.

With an official note, Baron Fava, the Italian minister, has declared to the secretary of state that the United States government, not having given assurance that the murderers of Italian subjects acquitted by American magistrates, and murdered in prison while under the immediate protection of the authorities of New Orleans, would be brought to justice, the Italian government has found itself under the very painful necessity of showing openly its dissatisfaction by recalling the minister of his majesty from a country where an Italian representative is unable to obtain justice. The baron will soon leave the United States, leaving the secretary of the legation in charge of only current affairs. This action by the Italian government caused the deepest surprise in official circles, when the fact became known. It has been generally supposed the Italian government would at least await the action of the New Orleans grand jury, which is charged with the investigation of the bloody tragedy at the New Orleans jail. It appears, however, that information received from its representative must have led the government to conclude that the grand jury investigation would fail to result in the punishment or even the indictment of any person connected with the killing of the Italians.

It is the general opinion of all the diplomats in Washington that Italy has put her foot in her mouth, so to speak, and made a break that will make her ridiculous before she straightens it out.

Italy has not yet made a motion to prove that any of the men killed in the New Orleans parish prison were Italian subjects. Until this is done as a preliminary, it is nothing short of impertinence on the part of Italy to ever pretend to interfere in our domestic affairs. They were to all intents and purposes American citizens, and if they ever had any allegiance to the king of Italy they had abjured it. There is no doubt, however, that the Italians are very angry.

Italy has her hands full trying to retain her place as a first-class power in Europe, and she is not going to waste her energies in an effort to slug the United States. Italy is poor. She has been maintaining an immense standing army and navy for some years back. Her expenditures have been greater than her receipts for three years or more. The people of Italy are poor, the currency is depreciated, and in a general way the country is in no condition to make war on a power like the United States. Army officers laugh at the idea of war. They would like to have a war, but they are not expecting one.

THE EAGLE SQUEALS.

The editor of the Long Creek Eagle goes into a howling rage over the chronicles that appeared in the News, in its issue of two weeks ago, and hurls down anathemas upon Dan Asbury, of this paper. He also complains that the chronicles came out at too late a day; and tries to make it appear that they cast reproach and insult upon the ladies of John Day, and suggests that they ought to lick poor Dan, for him.

Chronicles are a history of what has taken place, and are not usually written at the happening of the events they chronicle; but some time after they have transpired and when the heat of battle has subsided, to the end that they may be a true record of history.

The chronicles, which so appeared in this paper, cast no reproach upon any lady or ladies, and merely chronicled the fact that the pater "patted the fathers and sons of John Day, and some others," meaning by "some others," other voters of the county who did not reside at John Day; and did not intimate or insinuate that there was even one lady in John Day who had so lost her sense of propriety as to permit the pater to pat her. The management of this paper has too much regard for women to cast such a reproach upon them, or to ask them to take up its battles for it.
