

THE GRANT COUNTY NEWS,

July 9, 1891.

The president has appointed John W. Crawford agent for the Umatilla Indians, vice Lee Moorehouse, resigned.

Very near \$8,000,000 of trade dollars stored at the treasury department is to be received into ten cent and twenty-five cent pieces.

A Georgia teacher who could not teach one of her young pupils to remember the letter H cut one of the letters out and made him swallow it. This had the desired effect.

Parnell has married Mrs. O'Shea. He thinks his marriage will re-instate him as leader of the Irish home rule cause and says he is happier now than ever before in his life. He will visit America this year.

The small fry politicians are having a good deal to say about who is to receive the presidential nominations next year, but the big fellows, those who really control things, are keeping silent in seven languages on that subject.

During the present year many disastrous failures among the National banks in various sections have done much to bring discredit upon the system, which has been by its friends claimed to be well nigh perfect. The majority of these failures have been caused by downright thieving on the part of bank officials.

The negro miners lately arrived from the east and the white miners at Franklin, near Seattle, the other day, had a regular pitched battle. One negro was shot and two white men killed. Two companies of militia from Seattle went to the scene of the riot, and are encamped between the two races. The trouble is the outgrowth of a strike of the white miners against a reduction in wages which caused the coal company to secure the negro. There is liable to be more trouble yet.

At the last meeting of the farmers' county alliance of Lane county the following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the delegates present: "Resolved, that we demand of the next legislature a law creating precinct assessors, and that all property be listed for assessment on a certain day; that the present railroad commission be abolished and that in its stead a maximum rate will be established, and that the legal rate of interest be reduced to six per cent, and that the national government pass a law that will enable the people to borrow money at two per cent, on the sub-treasury plan or on approved security."

This year there were nineteen lieutenantcies in the army to be filled by appointments from civil life, and of the nineteen selected for examination six are the sons of army officers. It should be remembered that these appointments are entirely outside of the graduates of West Point, where many sons of army officers are every year appointed. The holding of a military or office holding aristocracy is every bit as objectionable as the titled aristocracy of Europe, and it will not long be tolerated in this country. It may become necessary for congress to enact a law absolutely prohibiting any son of any man in any branch of the government service being selected to fill an appointive office, in order to protect the rights of the people not in the magic circle.

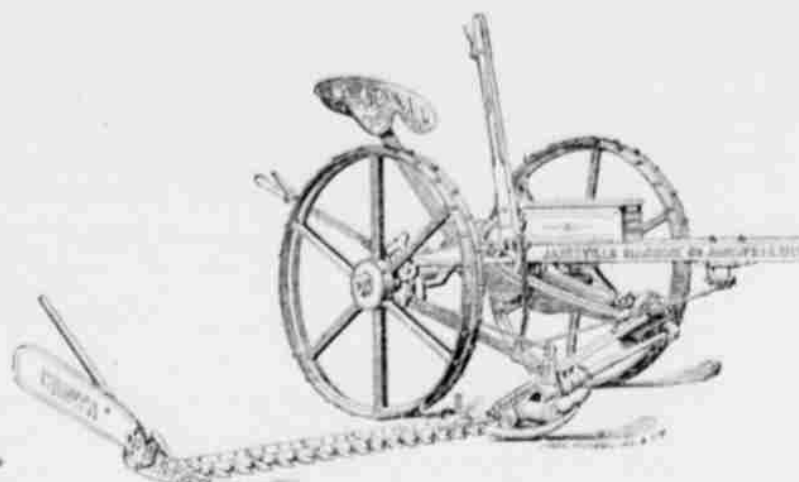
