The railroad commissioners have made a record. They raised the rates of fare for students of the State University. If they will force any reduction of rates or fare we shall make a note of their action.

Uncle Sam's vast pine forests should be handled carefully. The timber inspector is liable to visit Grant county at any time, and parties who have carelessly destroyed the timber are liable to be prosecuted to the law's extent.

A reciprocity treaty with San Domingo has been agreed upon, and will go into effect September 1st. Thus one by one the United States is forming these treaties with foreign countries, and by so doing is forming closer trade relations.

The stories told by the refugee Jews of the Russian persecutions are pitiful in the extreme. Not content with driving them from their homes and confiscating their property, the Russian authorities use means of personal physical tortures that are revolting in the extreme. The suspending of a man by the wrists for two hours forms a specimen of the inhumanities practiced.

Over 5,000,000 pounds of wool will be shipped from The Dalles this season—Oregon wool. Over 5,000,000 cans of salmon will be shipped from Astoria this season—Oregon salmon. Over 5,000,000 bushels of wheat will be shipped from the state this season—Oregon wheat. These are only a few. There are also Oregon fruits, Oregon gold, Oregon silver, Oregon timber, and a host of other Oregon products of 1891. Astorian.

The resignation of Senator Quay, chairman, and Col W. W. Dudley, treasurer, of the republican national committee, were accepted by the executive committee and Mr. J. S. Clarkson was elected chairman and instructed to appoint a treasurer. Mr. Quay has also resigned his place on the national committee, which removes him from national politics entirely. What effect this change will have on the party remains to be seen.

Sealing appears to have been effectually stopped in Behring sea, according to recent advices. The entrance to the sea is effectually blocked, and is now patrolled by five American and two British war vessels. The officers of one schooner, which was twice seized by the revenue cutter Ruski, say that nearly every schooner has received notice of the recent action of the two governments forbidding sealing. Some of them have decided to obey the proclamation forbidding sealing, but others, it is said, will venture to hunt seal on the Russian shore of the sea. Bral street's.

The possibilities of fruit as a profitable crop is just becoming known to the Oregon farmer. O. P. Beardsley, of Eola, has this year raised about 15,000 pounds of gooseberries, worth three cents a pound, and has produced 10,000 pounds of blackcap raspberries, which have sold at eight cents. His annual honey crop brings about \$200. He has twenty-five acres in hops and if the bugs will let them alone the outcome will be rich. On 11 acres of ground he will pick 500 bushels of peaches, worth more than that many dollars. They are trees set out four years ago. He has fifteen acres in young peach trees. What has been done in other sections of the state can be done in our own prolific Grant.

Hitherto Oregon and Washington have been singularly fortunate in being exempt from the ravages of fruit and vine pests. But now from all portions of the two states comes reports of the appearance of various species of lice. The pest is alive to the danger and is constantly warning the farmers of the dangers of delay in exterminating the pests. The Eugene Guard says: "Orchardists are urged to take prompt measures to save the apple and pear crop from the codlin moth, which has developed in great numbers since the warm weather set in. Carelessness and indifference on this subject will cost fruit growers very dear. The moth is like a mortgage—it works at night while the farmer sleeps. The only remedy is spraying and every grower who wants a crop of healthy fruit will do well to work with his spraying machine."

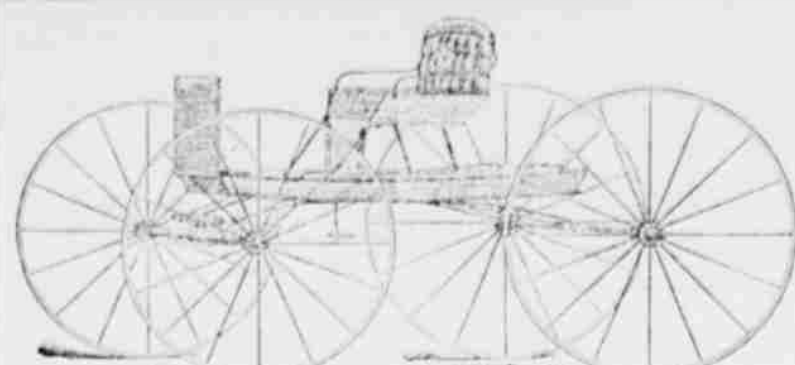
IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR GRANT COUNTY.
