In St. Louis a mortgage for \$59,000 has been filed by the San Francisco and St. Louis railroad company. The mortgage is drawn in favor of a New York company and has 100 years to run with interest at 4 per cent.

It has been concluded that what ever preservative is to be applied, the timber for piles, subjected to the action of searons, should first be charred, so as to kill any germs near the surface, open the pores of the wood for the antisepsis and destroy the nutritive matter upon which the worms live.

Governor Ferry has attacked Governor Pennoyer upon his strong suit—writing. The people of the two states may get ready to read a perfect flood of legal decisions and quotations from all kinds of authorities upholding Oregon's governor in the stand he has taken. Sylvester graduated at Yale, and prides himself upon his knowledge of law, so the figurative bar may be expected to fly—Oregonian.

An important exhibition of grain binding was made at Joliet, Ill., the other day. The Walter A. Wood company operated two machines. One binder used a straw band and the other bands with a twine of prairie grass. Both machines were successfully operated for several hours. It is expected that the use of straw or grass for binding material will solve the problem of cheap twine for farm uses.

This section of Eastern Oregon is rich in undeveloped resources of which the mineral interests rank perhaps the highest. The extent of our mines are unknown. Right here in Grant county we have ores containing gold, silver, lead, copper, iron, zinc and tellurium, besides deposits of sulphur, coal, lime, marble, chalcocite and asbestos. This development has scarcely begun. With the coming of capital this will be a wonderfully rich country.

For some time past there has been considerable talk about the amount of money in circulation per capita in the United States, therefore the tables prepared by the treasury department giving the exact figures may be said to fill a "long felt want." In 1863 the amount per capita in circulation was \$13.85; in 1865 it was \$20.82; in 1885 it was \$23.02 and on the first of January of the present year it reached the highest amount in our history, \$21.40. Since then it has been reduced by the heavy shipments of gold to foreign countries, and on the first of August it was \$21.37, or nearly back to what it was in 1885.

The almost daily occurrence of railroad disasters in the United States, involving loss of life and maiming of many victims, leads to the suspicion that due care and caution are not exercised by rail road companies. The Oregon railroad conference is endeavoring to earn a small per cent. of its salary by making inquiry into the causes of disasters occurring within the state. They are likely to accomplish some good in this line. A thorough inspection of track, trestles and bridges is needed. Not that of riding over the road on a Pullman car at twenty miles an hour, but a careful inspection by experienced railroad builders.

A more rigid inspection of dutiable mail matter at New York has been ordered by the treasury department, and under the new regulations everything except books will be seized as contraband. The order will specially affect articles produced by the various kinds of printing processes, such as hectographs, halftones, etchings, photographs, photogravures and engravings. The order of the treasury department will make the practice at the port of New York uniform with that at other ports, where the law has been more strictly construed.

The anti-Sunday saloon agitation has been started at Buckley, and the town officers have been informed by a number of citizens that they must enforce the law.
