

THE GRANT COUNTY NEWS.

September 17, 1891.

Twenty-one Catholic sisters of charity have been granted certificates to teach in the public schools of Texas. This is an innovation that will be watched with great interest by both Protestants and Catholics.

The Chinese government appears at last to be waking up, and a commission has been sent to Europe to determine which of the rifles in use by European armies is the best and to order 500,000 of them for the Chinese army.

To the surprise of his neighbors a man in Maine has raised a good crop of tobacco, which is claimed to be of finer quality than that grown in the South. This may be true, but it reads like the advertisement of a real estate boomer.

They are now talking about railroad trains at a speed of ninety miles an hour. When a train goes at that speed flies the track or has a collision there will be no occasion to send a physician to the wreck; only undertakers will be needed.

About the boldest theft on record is that of a Kansas man who employed a steam threshing outfit, men and wagons, and removed a crop of wheat from a farm, sold it and walked off with the money, about \$1000—in his pocket without anybody suspecting that he was not the rightful owner of the wheat, and not satisfied with stealing the wheat he left without paying the men who had helped him handle it.

Rev. Taylor S. Nightingale, pastor of the largest colored Baptist church in the United States, has created a decided sensation at Memphis, Tenn., by advising his flock to arm themselves with Winchester rifles for the purpose of exterminating the whites. Those who know what influence the average negro preacher has over his people will appreciate the effect of such advice. A large number of his people actually adopted his advice and have purchased repeating rifles.

If Secretary Tracy's orders are properly carried out the navy yards of the country will be effectively removed from the effects of partisan politics. Some time ago he made the principal physicians in all the navy yards subject to competitive examinations, open to all; and now, most important of all, he has issued an order that "no officer or employee of the government shall require or request any workman in any yard to contribute or pay any money for patriotic purposes," and that "no workman shall be removed or discharged for his political opinions."

Secretary Noble has decided a case that has been long pending, and which is very important to many people in Oregon, and that is concerning the struggle for swamp lands adjacent to lakes Harney and Malheur. These lands were given to the state under the swamp land act and sold to different purchasers who have claimed them. Notwithstanding this, settlers went upon the lands and endeavored to prove that they were not swamp lands. The purchasers were subjected to a great deal of inconvenience, the property destroyed and the claimants proved themselves generally reckless. When the claims were made special agents were sent out, and five different agents at three different times went out and reported that the lands were swamps. The contestants, however, had been initiated, and having been denied, the claimants appealed, asking for a hearing and trial of each separate tract. This Secretary Noble refuses to grant. He says both the interior department and the state department have agreed upon what was swamp, and all the special agents' reports have agreed upon the same basis, and therefore the hearings must be denied. Of the original lists there were 97,641 acres and the Lakeview district which was certified and approved in 1882. In 1888 the list was set aside and an investigation ordered and a new list prepared. Under this 11,962 acres were patented to the state, 20,000 restored to the public domain and 58,000 acres declared doubtful. Later 37,742 acres were approved as swamp lands and 16,000 designated as swamp by the agent who held up, because settlers occupied the lands. It was out of this last lot that the decision was rendered which is in favor of the state and the purchasers from the state.
