GERMANY's squadron of evolution will be sent out in two divisions of three battleships, a despatch boat, and seven torpedo boats each. They will be manned by 250 officers and 5,000 seamen. The commander of all will be Vice Admiral Delhard.

Some interesting figures showing the cost of some of the guns used in the British land and sea service are furnished by a recent parliamentary return. From this it appears that nine 15-inch guns have been issued to the navy at an average cost of \$55,900. The 10-inch guns cost \$31,480 each, and the 5-inch \$2,840.


