

MUSIC AND MUSICIANS.
George F. Root, who wrote "The Battle Cry of Freedom," "The Grand March," "The Sweetest Song," is living at an advanced age in Chicago.
LITURGICAL musicians are not allowed to perform in St. Petersburg, and those who are of foreign nationality are not permitted to pass the frontier of the empire.
