Wadhams & Co. report the sugar war is still unsettled, and there is no telling how prices will go.

Manila rope advanced 24 cents on March 8 and 25 cents on the 9th. The flour market is firm and unchanged.

Thos. Bernhelm reports the hop market in an excellent condition. The farmers who pooled their last year's crop will make money.
