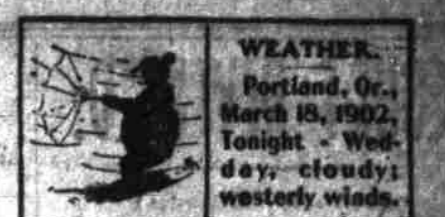

## BRIBERY CHARGES ARE MENTIONED

### Slate of Candidates Being Made by the Factions.

While both factions of the Republican party are talking peace and harmony in public and on the streets, the county convention tomorrow is likely to be one of the most hotly contested battles in the history of Multnomah County politics. It is rumored on the streets that the Regular Republicans lack only five delegates of having a majority after having carefully counted up, and many believe the other five will be forthcoming tomorrow. Rumors of contests over the seats of the delegates from the country precincts are rife.

It is said that the Independents will contest the delegation from South Mt. Tabor, where the Regulars cast a vote of four to one, from St. Johns, where there was no opposition and where the delegates were elected by acclamation, and from several other precincts. The Regular Republican delegates met last night in the City Hall and talked over the situation. There was no attempt to fix up a slate and no names were suggested for office. Everybody talked harmony and unanimously agreed that in no event would the convention be boycotted.

The Regular delegates will hold another meeting tonight at the same place, to perfect an organization. A delegation will be selected and a candidate for permanent chairman of the convention agreed on. The Independent Republicans of the East Side met last night and, it is said, decided on their choice of a pro rata share of the spoils.

It was rumored on the street this morning that the Independents had called a meeting for 2 o'clock at the postoffice, but this is denied by Judge Carey and other leaders. However, it is understood that the Independents will meet somewhere tonight and prepare a slate.

**A LIBERAL OFFER.** It is a good authority that, acting in behalf of harmony, the Independents offered to give to the Regulars five city and county offices. Four of these are: Assessor; Capt. Charles E. McDonald; Coroner; Dr. Travis; Clerk, L. Q. Swetland and Auditor, T. C. Devlin. The Regulars laugh at this offer. They say that no power in the city could defeat Captain McDonald and Mr. Devlin; that the office of Coroner is entirely non-political and should be under civil service rules, and that the new law has robbed the office of Clerk of its prestige and emoluments. The fifth office is not known.

**HINTS OF BRIBERY.** Charges and counter charges of attempted bribery have been made. The Independents have made vague and indefinite charges against the Regulars, while on the other hand charges that are neither vague nor indefinite are made against the Independents by one of their own delegates. A delegate who was elected on the Independent ticket, but who favored the re-election of Senator Simon said he was improperly approached by F. L. Willis, a prominent Independent leader. This delegate will vote against the Independents in the convention.

**SLATE MATERIAL.** At the Independent caucus tonight in making up the slate the following names will be considered:

Senate—Judge Henry E. McGinn; Representatives—William Banks John Driscoll, Larry Sullivan, Harry White, Billy Brown, Charles Burkhardt, Al Thomas, Albert Ferrari, W. E. Burke, Jack Matthews, Graham Glass, Jr.

The Regular Republicans will probably have under consideration some of the following names: Joint Senator with Clackamas County—George A. Sidel; Representatives—Dr. O. F. S. Plummer, Edward Holman, Abe Thomer, Mose Block, Sig. Vortheimer, Marks Ryke, Sam Wolf, J. Jackson, A. Walter Wolfe, Martin Luther Pipes.

**THE OLD GUARD.** Chairman Adams and Secretary Gates, of the Democratic City and County Committee, have issued a call to the 800 Democrats who voted at the recent primaries to assemble in mass meeting at Eagle Hall, Saturday evening at 7:30 o'clock, to organize precinct and ward clubs. This meeting will be in the nature of a love feast, and speeches will be made by George E. Chamberlain, Capt. Sam White and other Democratic war horses. Besides

**POLITICAL NOTES.** The Republicans of Marion county held their convention Saturday and elected Senator J. N. Williamson for Congress. The Crook county convention also endorsed Williamson. The Marion county convention named the following county ticket: Clerk, Vawter Crawford; sheriff, E. M. Shurt; assessor, W. L. Saffling; treasurer, Mathew Lichenhall; county commissioner, John Williams; survivor, J. F. Rayne; coroner, Dr. F. Kistner.

W. W. Smead was elected chairman of the County Central Committee. A candidate for representative will be nominated jointly with Umatilla county at the State convention.

The Democratic primaries in Lane county will be held March 29, and the county convention April 8. The apportionment is for 194 delegates.

The Democratic primaries in Baker county will be held March 29, and the county convention April 3. H. M. McCord has resigned as Chairman of the County Committee and Frank M. Saxton was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Harney county Republicans held primaries Saturday and elected delegates to the county convention. The delegation is divided between Moody and Williamson for Congress.

**POSTPONEMENT** May be Asked by the Independents.

It is rumored this afternoon that the Independents will seek to have the work of the convention postponed for a day. It is said they are not so sure of being in control and hope that a delay will aid them to better fulfill their promises in relation to the officers for which nominations are to be made.

**SECRETARY LYON'S VIEWS.** Walter Lyon, private secretary to Governor Geer, is in the city. In speaking of the Republican primaries in Marion county, Friday, he said: "A strong personal fight was waged against the Governor, largely by disgruntled office seekers, and the result of the primaries was a grand endorsement of the present state administration and a complete refutation of all the charges that have been made from time to time against the Governor."

"In Salem precinct No. 2, which is the largest ward in the city and the home of the leader of the opposition, who is a candidate for Attorney-General, the business men arose almost en masse in their support of Mr. Geer, and gave him a vote of three to one. The result of the Marion county primaries is a great compliment to the Governor, and furthermore is the greatest personal victory ever won in Marion county politics, where the party has always been divided."

**COUNTY COMMISSIONERSHIP.** There is a question as to whether County Commissioner Showers' term of office expires on the first of the fiscal year. The new law abolishing the then county court provided that Commissioner Showers should not go out of office until the general election succeeding the one at which Mr. Mack's successor is to be named. However, there is a provision in the constitution that says that no appointments shall be made for a longer time than the next general election. Acting on this, both political parties in their calls for county conventions, stated that two candidates for that office would be nominated.

The name of ex-Mayor W. A. Storey has been mentioned in connection with the shrievalty. Mr. Storey states that he is not a candidate for Sheriff but he would be glad of another chance to make a fight for Mayor.

Later returns show that the two delegates to the county convention from Bertha precinct are regulars.

The Democrats of Graham favor the nomination of D. M. Roberts for Road Supervisor. The Troutdale Democrats will nominate J. M. Hilliard for this position. John Hinterman will make the race in Fairview precinct.

Attorney William D. Fenton has given an opinion that County Commissioner Showers is entitled to remain in office until the general election in 1904.

## DEFUNCT BANK CASE.

John Kiernan has commenced suit in Judge George's department, Circuit Court, to collect on two notes amounting to \$900, made by Mary Dempsey et al. Kiernan bought the collateral from the receiver of the defunct Portland Savings Bank. James Gilsoun, for defendant, denied that Mary Dempsey made the notes or received the money; but avers that Mary Rogers, now dead, who was custodian of her funds, did the money. Attorney Vespie put Former Receiver Nixon on the stand and the bank's books were introduced in evidence.

## TOWN CAPTURED.

## KWANG SI REVOLT.

### Imperial Soldiers Joining Rebels.

HONG KONG, March 18.—The rebellion in Kwang Si, Kwang Tung and Yunan provinces is assuming a serious aspect. The rebels recently routed a large imperial force after a two days' fight. The rebels are looting towns, seizing government supplies and murdering mandarins. Many imperial soldiers are joining them.

## REBEL VICTORY

WASHINGTON, March 18.—The Navy Department this afternoon received the following cablegram from Capt. Rodgers, commanding the United States gunboat Marietta:

"Colon, March 18.—The Liberal army has gained a victory. The rebels have possession of the country west of Panama. Fighting is expected on the Isthmus."

## ONE DISAPPEARS.

ST. LOUIS, March 18.—John Muddell, one of the ex-aldermen indicted for bribery, failed to appear when his name was called this morning, and his bond forfeited. The Circuit Court attorney stated in court that he expected other persons under indictment will disappear, and that any amount of money will be spent to prevent the cases from coming to trial.

## FURIOUS.

This is a preliminary to an effort to reduce the representation in the House of those states which restrict negro suffrage. Southern Congressmen are furious over the plan. ## RHODES SINKING.

## WAR TAX REPEAL.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—At a meeting of the Senate finance committee this morning it was decided to report favorable the House bill repealing all war taxes. A few unimportant amendments, which do not alter the effect of the bill, was agreed to. The report will probably not be made until next week.

## HOT STUFF

### Blumauer and McGinn Have an Inning.

## Racy Questions Cause Excitement in Court.

The thawing-out of a Mendicite grubstake suit, brought by Blumauer, of this city, against Robert Highe, a miner, panned out some interesting "dirt" relating to personal affairs, in Judge Sear's court this morning.

While the plaintiff was on the witness stand, Henry E. McGinn, attorney for the defendant, asked if it were not a fact that the (Blumauer) was to a drunk the most of the time while he was in Alaska looking after business interests.

"I don't know as I was drunk any more times than you have been here!" replied the witness, promptly.

"I know I have been drunk, but I never have robbed a man of his money," retorted Mr. McGinn, angrily.

"If I did, I don't know as that's any worse than getting boys under 21 years of age to serve on the jury, as I know of being done by some one around here!" responded Mr. Blumauer.

"Gentleman, this is all immaterial and unneeded for," interposed Judge Sear.

The disputants then backed up, and Sasherson Reed, Mr. Blumauer's attorney, excused the witness.

Blumauer claimed to have paid Highe a consideration for a six-fourth interest in the latter's mining prospects. Highe told Judge Sear and says that the agreement between them was fraudulent because he, not being able to read, did not understand the condition.

## BOERS CAPTURED

LONDON, March 18.—Lord Kitchener, in his report to the war office today, announces the capture of Commandant Emmett, the redoubtable Boer who led the victorious Boer forces in the fight at Italia, Zululand, last October. The capture was effected in a fight last Saturday near Ngephi Basin. Four Boers were killed and six wounded in the engagement. Commandant Hehren was also captured and Commandant Celliers, who did effective work at a critical time during the engagement between Delarey and Methuen, has been wounded. Since March 19 the Boers have lost eleven killed and seven wounded, and 120 surrendered.

## UNCLE SAM

### Must Keep His Hands off Turkey.

## TO MEET BROTHER.

CUXHAVEN, Germany, March 18.—Prince Henry arrived here this afternoon and was cordially greeted by the Kaiser and a great crowd.

**CUXHAVEN, March 18.**—The first one to greet the Prince was the Kaiser. He embraced his brother, kissing him heartily on both cheeks. After leaving the Kaiser the Prince was greeted by the American Consul, with whom he shook hands. The Prince immediately took a special train for Kiel.
