**WANT HUSBANDS.**

**Catholic Girls Praying for Propositions.**

NEW YORK, March 20.—The women of St. Joseph's Catholic church, Hoboken, are concluding a novena of nine days' prayer, to bring them husbands. The church report last year showed the number of marriages to be inconsistent with the other parish statistics and it is to improve the report in this respect for the current year that the novena was begun. Whether the young men are too bashful or whether they do not believe in early marriage, is not known, but there is no end of attractive young women in the parish, and all of them declare that the falling off in weddings has been no fault of theirs.

**PANAMA CANAL.**

(Journal Special Service.)  
WASHINGTON, March 20.—Dr. Conchas, the new Colombian minister, will this week present to our government a proposition covering the concessions wanted for the Panama canal. At the Colombian legation it is said that this proposal will be favorable to the United States and will remove all doubt as to the validity of the title so far as the Colombian end of the transaction is concerned. Nothing will be done in the senate with the canal bill till after Secretary Hay shall have had an opportunity to reach an agreement with the Colombian minister.

**TAYLOR COMING.**

Secretary Reed of the Chamber of Commerce received a letter this morning from Colonel Dosch, who is representing Oregon at the Charleston exposition. Colonel Dosch says that President Roosevelt is expected in Charleston between April 5 and 12, and preparations for his reception are now under way. The President's menu while in Charleston will be varied by the addition of some of the real Oregon salmon. Preparations are now making to forward by express 100 pounds of this toothsome fish.

Prof. F. W. Taylor, chief of the Department of Agriculture of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition in St. Louis, will be in Oregon in the near future, in the interest of the exposition, and a cordial reception will be tendered him. He had charge of the agricultural department at Omaha, and the horticultural and forestry department at Buffalo.

Colonel Dosch says that the attendance at the exposition is steadily increasing, the average now being over a thousand a day.

**HATCHET BURIED.**  
**A Prince Henry Dinner Restored Harmony.**

(Journal Special Service.)  
NEW YORK, March 20.—Intense interest was occasioned today in the development that at a dinner given by the President to Prince Henry is said to have been the occasion of a complete reconciliation between the John D. Rockefeller and Henry H. Rogers factions in the Standard Oil Company, which have been at odds for several months.

While the personal relations between the two men always have been of the most cordial character they and their respective groups of friends have been on opposite sides of the stock market ever since the Northern Pacific corner brought the entire Wall street district to the verge of ruin last May.

The first clash between them came the day after Northern Pacific sold up to \$1000. John D. Rockefeller then discovered for the first time that the crisis had been precipitated by an attempt on the part of the so-called National City Bank crowd to get control of the Northern Pacific Railroad during Mr. Morgan's absence in Europe, whether he had gone to interest English capital in the shares of the United States Steel Corporation, in which John D. Rockefeller is one of the largest shareholders.

**GREAT ELK EVENT.**

MISSOULA, Mont., March 20.—Heraldic lodge of Elks of Missoula is preparing for the biggest event next Saturday night that has ever occurred in the city's history of fraternalism. A class of about 50 fawns are to be gathered. The candidates are coming from Phillipsburg, Hamilton and Missoula, including many of the prominent citizens of these cities.

Large delegations are to come from Helena, Butte and Wallace, Idaho, to add interest to the festivities. The Boston & Montana band will accompany the Butte delegation.

**SIX MILLIONS.**

**The Capital Stock of Heinze's Big Mining Company.**

(Journal Special Service.)  
SALT LAKE CITY, March 20.—Articles of incorporation have been filed with the Secretary of State by the Nipper Consolidated Copper Company. The company is incorporated for \$3,750,000 and, upon the basis of the scheduled valuation of its property in Silver Bow county, claims to have assets to the amount of \$5,748,000.

The company was organized under the laws of New York last December and is a public corporation. The capital stock is divided into 150,000 shares of \$25 each. But \$300,000 has so far been paid in by the incorporators, who are Stanley M. Gifford, of St. Nassau Street, New York, Arthur E. Heinze, of the same city and address, and Richard B. Harvey, of Nyack, N. Y.

The purpose for which the company is organized is the sweeping and operations are only limited to the possessions of the United States. The life of the company is perpetual.

The assets of the company, which include the following property in Butte, are scheduled as follows:

Five-thirty-sixths of the Nipper, \$603,000; L. E. R. (east), \$1,500,000; one-fourth of the Farnell, \$300,000; Schwab, \$1,200,000; one-half of the nightingale, \$480,000; twenty-five thirty-sixths of the Nipper, \$2,000,000; four-fifths of the L. E. R. (west), \$300,000; one-half of the Fairmount, \$100,000; Balm, \$50,000; a total of \$5,748,000.

The liabilities are given at \$2,000,000 being a bonded debt drawing 5 per cent interest per annum, secured by a first mortgage upon the above property.

Aber- B. Clements of Butte is named as the general manager and agent in Montana.

**FROM NEW ZEALAND.**

General Passenger Agent Craig, of the O. R. & N., has received from a correspondent in New Zealand several samples of what is known as kauri gum. This is a resinous substance found in the ground there, which, when dissolved, forms the basis of a most lustrous varnish. Nobody knows how old these pieces of gum are, which closely resemble amber. The trees from which they came are no longer in existence. When a halve, or even one of the whites, desires to make a little money "on the side," all he has to do, says Mr. Craig's correspondent, is to thrust a spear into the ground and dig the stuff up.

The pieces of kauri gum Mr. Craig exhibits are very fine specimens. The largest piece is polished, showing the interior, which reflects nearly every shade of the rainbow.

The gentleman in New Zealand and Mr. Craig have been in correspondence for some years, and manage to keep each other posted as to the way things are going in their respective countries.

**BILL TOO HIGH.**

In their petition for discharge, made before State Circuit Judge Fraser, Receivers L. E. Latourette's and E. E. Mergers' bill of \$319 for receivers' fees and \$250 for attorneys' fees, was emphatically turned down in the case of First National Bank vs. Oregon Pulp & Paper Company. Judge Fraser allowed the receivers \$75 each.

The petitioners set forth that they had run the paper mill at Bridal Veil, Or., for a period of four months and had turned out \$2710 pounds of paper, which had been sold for \$94,000. It was further stated that there was a balance of \$309.97 on hand, and the outstanding debts amounted to \$33.
