(Journal Special Service.) NEW YORK, March 29.-The great Catholic pilgrimage which is to visit Rome for the purpose of honoring the papal jubilee of Leo XIII. will sail in the early part of July. It will be under the auspices of the Fathers of Mercy and divided into three sections.

The first will be under the direction o Father Porcoile, pastor of the Church of Our Lady of Lourdes. The second will be led by Father Moadam, and in charge of the third will be Father William File Smith, the fire chaplain of this city, Father Smith conducted pilgrimages to Rome in 1895 and 1896 and Father Porcoile has taken bodies of American Catholics to the Keternal City at various times since 1894.
