## SPEEDING EAST.

Record-Breaking Run of a Big Freight Train.

The Indrapura, the O. R. & N.'s Asiatic steamer, on its arrival here last week brought in a consignment of matting, wall paper, raw silk and hats, which, when shipped East, filled no less than 26 cars. The cargo came from Shanghal and Hong Kong. The matting was destined for Philadelphia, Baltimore, St. Louis, Hoston and New York; the paper for Toronto. The hats and raw silk were destined also for New York. These were sent out from Portland Saturday night on a passenger train for the East, since the shipment was contracted for with that special provision.

It requires passenger trains only about four and one-half days to make the run across the continent. By freight train the time would be little less than two weeks. The value of a baggage carload of raw silk, in round numbers, is about 1800,000. It will readily be seen that the interest on this sum for ten days, the difference between a freight and passenger train's time, is a stim quite worth swing. The antire consignment was routed via 1816 O. R. & N., Union Tacific, Militade Central, Michigan Central, and the Haltismore & Ohlo. By special arrangement with all the lines over which the sonsignment is now specifing, an effort will be made to reduce the running time of the through freight train to about eight days. The train left late Sunday night, and should reach Omaha tonight or Friday morning.
