

SELECT EXPOSITION SITE AT ONCE

(SAYS McALLEN.)

Dan McAllen, a hearty advocate of the Lewis and Clark Centennial, waxed warm yesterday in response to a query by a Journal representative on how to make the fair successful and what it will do for Portland.

"The fair," began Mr. McAllen, "is just the thing to get the people of Portland in action. That fact was proven by the generous subscription toward the celebration by the people."

"The fair will give to this section of the country world-wide attention and will leave some good effects behind it."

"I want to say this to the pessimistic friends who take such gloomy views of everything, that, after all the visitors have gone home, we will commence to get actual results. There will be no setback if such a thing is possible, because we will be in pretty good condition to meet it."

"I want to say to the real estate dealers who advertise that property will advance before the 1906 fair, that property after the fair will be worth more than before."

"We all know what a world's fair means and know its benefits and disadvantages."

"Buffalo, St. Louis and Charleston have nothing to offer except the exposition buildings and its attractions. Here we have something to offer the people. All

that is necessary is to get people here and show them the country.

"One great thing that will make the fair a success is the liberal use of printing ink properly directed. We have already received through the courtesy of the newspapers thousands of columns of advertising that didn't cost us a cent, and the class of advertising that money can't buy."

"We are well aware of the causes that led to the failure of the Buffalo Exposition. The New York Tribune said in this matter:

"One was an earlier start in the agitation for a fair, thus securing larger appropriations; another was an earlier beginning of the work on grounds and buildings; the third was a better site."

"The site for the fair should be selected at once, so as to get an early start. It takes time to get landscape effects. Let us be in shape for the critical eyes of the people who will come from far Eastern cities. There is no use in shifting responsibility in this matter and the selection of the site should be delayed no longer."

"By making an early start we can furnish employment to our own people and every dollar spent will be spent at home. By waiting what would be the result? We would bring 10,000 mechanics here from the East. We have lots of men right here for the purpose."

"Let us select that site at once."

MRS. SHEPHERD MAY TAKE PART IN ELECTION

Margaret L. Shepherd, the ex-Romanist lecturer, spoke to a crowded house at the A. O. U. W. hall yesterday afternoon and evening. She dwelt at length on the matter of secret confession to the priest and gave her reasons why Protestants and Roman Catholics should not intermarry.

Her evening lecture consisted mainly of attention to purgatory and kindred beliefs. She was interrupted by applause and remarks from the audience from time to time.

Before beginning her remarks she asked how many in the audience had read the morning paper. A number of hands were raised, whereupon she said in a tone of satisfaction: "The newspapers have attacked my character and reputation before, but I want to say right here that neither they nor the Catholic church have ever succeeded in proving anything on me. They can not, and I defy them to."

"I shall be very glad," she said, "if some one will convey to the police department my hearty thanks for the assistance rendered me by them last week." Henry McGinn, Father O'Reilly and others came in for their share of attention. One of the num-

ber was sitting in the corner at the back of the hall. Mrs. Shepherd made frequent allusions to him in a sarcastic tone.

Mrs. Shepherd spoke at length on the questions of purgatory, indulgence, the scapular and the rosary. She maintained that the teachings of the Catholic church are that the death of Christ did not make full satisfaction for the sins of the world, and that they make a purely commercial transaction of the question of purgatory. She estimated that there are probably 8,000,000 Catholics who have purchased two rosary beads at 25 cents each, the total value of which represents \$4,000,000 poured into the coffers of the Catholic church. The articles are brought into this country free of duty.

She will leave shortly for British Columbia points, but says she will return to Portland in the near future. It is her desire to be present at the June election in Portland, she said.

RAILROAD RUMBLES.

Announcement comes from the City of Mexico that a new railroad is to be built from that place to connect it with the Pacific Coast. It is even declared that the work is to be begun within 30 days and to be rapidly pushed on to completion. The enterprise is said to be one originated by General Miller, who recently visited the Mexican city in company with President Loree of the Baltimore & Ohio.

Believing such course advisable, the Chicago-St. Paul lines have withdrawn all special secret rates for home-seekers on the roads running into Iowa and Nebraska. This is unquestionably the result of the action of the Interstate Commerce Commission, which served injunctions on the lines running west from Chicago.

Authority has been given by the Transcontinental Passenger Association to the Rio Grande lines allowing them to quote the same rates and to extend the same privileges on stop-overs, etc., as those granted other lines. This refers to the coming meetings in Portland of the T. P. A. and the A. O. U. W. conventions.

PILOT COMMISSION.

Replies to Statements Concerning the Bar.

Secretary Russell of the Portland Chamber of Commerce has received the following letter from W. T. Chutter, clerk of the State Board of Pilot Commissioners, in answer to one from the chamber stating that there was only 17 feet of water on the Columbia river bar and enclosing letters from the masters of the steamships Oceano and Quito to the same effect:

"Dear Sir: Your letter of the 3d inst. to the commission has been handed to me to answer, and in reply will say that we have taken the matter up with the pilots, and find that Pilot Cann, who brought the steamship Quito in, has written to you in advance, fully answering it. There evidently must be a reason on the part of some person or persons for the circulation of these reports, and I am beginning to doubt very much whether the reports are entirely true, and if not, I am at a loss to know the object in making them."

"In regard to the reports from the captain of the steamship Quito, where he says the bar was perfectly smooth, I understand that the weather reports say that the bar was very rough in the morning and reports it as being rough later on in the day, so if one part of this report is proven false, it is quite likely, in my judgment, the balance is."

"I can not see what benefit it is to the pilots to keep making these reports, and then contradicting them, and I think it would be far better for the captains of ships to make their reports before leaving port, so that we could bring the pilot and them face to face in the matter."

"These reports generally come to the commission some time after the captain has left port, and I can not understand the reason of it. I can assure you that this commission is willing to assist you in all matters that will benefit the commerce of this state if we are given the opportunity and deem it consistent, and I would like to ask you as a personal favor what object do you think a pilot can have in making these reports, and then contradicting them, as it is too deep for me?"

KICKED OUT OF BED.

The Grimes Divorce Case Has Some Racy Features.

Charges of infidelity, a husband jabbed with hatpins, and the attacking wife kicked out of bed, comprise the sensational finish of 25 years of married life, now before the divorce courts of Astoria, between a couple well known in Portland.

Sarah A. Grimes is suing C. C. Grimes, proprietor of the famous Grimes summer resort hotel at Clatsop Beach, for divorce on the grounds of cruelty. The case is one of the most sensational ever commenced in Clatsop County.

G. M. Grimes, son of Mrs. C. C. Grimes, is co-defendant. About one year ago Grimes brought suit against his wife on charges of unfaithfulness to the marriage vows. It was alleged that Mrs. Grimes had made mysterious trips from the seashore to Portland, and that sufficient evidence of an incriminating nature had been discovered against her. But before the suit ever came to trial, Mrs. Grimes succeeded in satisfying her husband that she was willing to forget the past for the sake of the children, of whom they had seven. The husband agreed to the truce on condition that nothing of the kind should ever happen again. The renewed relations went on swimmingly for a time. The wife was so much more attentive and loving to her hubby after the reconciliation than she was before that Mr. Grimes was more than pleased.

As evidence of good faith that she need fear no further anxiety of divorce proceedings, being commenced against her, Mr. Grimes deeded over to his wife a good portion of the most valuable property he possessed. The transfer included the fine hotel fronting the ocean, built a few years ago. About this time the father deeded the remainder of his property over to his son, G. M. Grimes, in payment of a debt amounting to \$11,627 and on condition that the son would assist in the support of the father in his declining years.
