R. R. CONSOLIDATION

Roads West of Rockies to be Operated From Central Point.

(Journal Special Service.)
NEW YORK, April 16.—As a result of E. H. Harriman's extended trip to the Pacific Coast, it is rumored in Wall street that there will be a further consolidation of the railroad lines composing the Harriman system.

The rumor goes so far as to be in some quarters a positive announcement that all the lines west of the Rocky Mountains will be operated from some central point, making the operating headquarters of the system at either Salt Lake or Ogden.

This, it is said, involves merely maintaining nominal general offices

to satisfy legal requirements and supervise steamship connections at Pacific Coast terminal points, such as San Francisco, Cal., for the Southern Pacific, and Portland, Or., for the Oregon Railroad, but the executive force and chief operating center will be established at a more central point.

Men well informed in regard to the Harriman properties generally agree that this means the abolishment of several expensive offices and salaried positions among the various branches of the system, and it is spoken of as a long step toward effecting economical management of this great transcontinental chain.

GEN. MALVAR SURRENDERS

A Section Freed From Rebellion—Punishment for Datos.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—General Chaffee, in a cablegram to the War Department today, announces the surrender of General Malvar, thus ending organized resistance to the United States in the department north of the Philippines.

He also says that an expedition of 1,200 men have been sent to arrest the Moros who murdered an American soldier near Parang, Pampanga, and punish the Datos who refused to turn the murderers over to the American authorities.

He adds that every precaution will be taken to not bring on a general war with the Moros, but that it is necessary that our authority be respected and the sovereignty of the United States be fully acknowledged.

TWO THOUSAND KILLED OR CAPTURED

HARRIMAN AT DEL MONTE

The woman's story, briefly told is that she had a fight with one of the women known as the "Bisque Babe" or "Liverpool Liz," and that she got the worst of it. Dr. Johnson was called by a good Samaritan and, after being patched up, she was sent to jail to recover.

The name the woman gives is probably fictitious and Smith may have no acquaintance with her.

CORBETT-JEFFRIES

Match Said to be Practically Arranged.

THE SAME OLD LAW

Test Vote of 47 to 29 Shows the Temper of the Senate on Exclusion.

WASHINGTON, April 16.—On this day for taking a vote on the Chinese exclusion bill, the Senate met two hours earlier than usual. The time was given Senators who desired an opportunity to discuss the measure before the hour of voting.

Before the bill was taken up Frye presented resolutions received from Federations of Labor urging the adoption of the Pacific Coast bill, and declaring that neither the Platt amendment nor the Proctor bill, extending the present laws, will be satisfactory. He also presented over 70 telegrams received from San Francisco, Portland and Seattle, asking for the adoption of the Platt amendment.

When the bill was laid before the Senate, Senator Turner, of Washington, took the floor to reply to what he claimed was a personal assault made upon him yesterday by Senator Spooner, of Wisconsin.

Senator Turner had stated that the bill had no politics in it when it came from the committee. It was a measure for the protection of the people of our land.

Spooner expressed dissatisfaction with the pending bill and also with the substitute. He was astonished to hear from the Washington Senator (Turner) an imputation of unworthy motives on the part of the Senators on the Republican side of the chamber.

Replying to Turner, Senator Spooner said that not a breath of party division had occurred on this measure, until the Senator from Washington had injected it into the discussion, evidently with the belief that when he left the Republican party all its virtues departed with him. The Republican party needed no defense, Spooner said, against the charge that it opposed effective Chinese exclusion. But, Spooner said, he believed in keeping treaty obligations and either there should be exclusion consistent with our treaty, or else, if necessary required, there should be an abrogation of that treaty.

In the course of a rapidly spoken and plainly impetuous speech today, Senator Turner declared that he had followed the Republican party as long as he could, and far longer than he ought to have done. He didn't believe that when he left the party all virtue had ceased to exist in that party.

He said he felt no bitterness toward the party of Lincoln and Grant, but he declared that if those great men could return to earth, they would fail to recognize any of the principles for which they stood in the Republican party of today.

He asserted that the party preferred the dollar to the man; that it was opposed to the principle of human rights, and that it was grossly material in all its instincts.

He insisted that the party had no little regard for the principles of liberty that at this moment it was attempting to drown in a sea of blood—a sea of people struggling for independence.

The Quay amendment, providing that Chinese Christians, or Chinese who assisted in the defense or relief of any foreign legations at Peking, be admitted, was lost.

Patterson of Colorado followed with a violent denunciation of the opponents of the measure.

He declared their purpose was to make quick and sure, with cheap labor, the exploration of the Philippines when their time came.

Hanna followed Patterson, declaring that he considered an essential feature of the bill the re-enactment of the law that for years had protected the laboring men of the country, and he would vote for that amendment.

Just before the voting began, Fairbanks started to speak, saying the pending bill violated no treaty rights. The voting began promptly at 1 o'clock. The first amendment voted on was the Lodge amendment, striking out the section declaring it unlawful for an American vessel to employ Chinese in its crew.

This was adopted, 47 to 29.

STRIKE SPREADS

Belgium in an Uproar—Glass Works Burned.

CHARLEROI, Belgium, April 16.—The strikers today set fire to and destroyed the Courcelles Glass Works. The loss will amount to half a million francs.

SHOTGUNS AT FUNERAL

BRUSSELS, April 16.—The funerals of the two citizens killed in the recent riots occurred this morning.

Platoons of gendarmes, armed with shotguns, were stationed along the road to the cemetery.

Hundreds silently followed the bodies afoot, and the utmost decorum was maintained.

TELEGRAMS CENSURED.

BRUSSELS, April 16.—The strike continues to spread among the miners and workmen of all classes.

Today the Socialists intend to make a formal demand in the Chambers for universal suffrage. As the demands will doubtless be set aside it is feared that serious trouble will ensue.

The Government is censoring all telegrams.

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CARRIED GOLD FROM VAULT

Two other watchmen also saw Dimmick leave the Mint about midnight with a dress suit case.

The occurrence was not reported until the robbery was discovered, as they did not suspect anything wrong.

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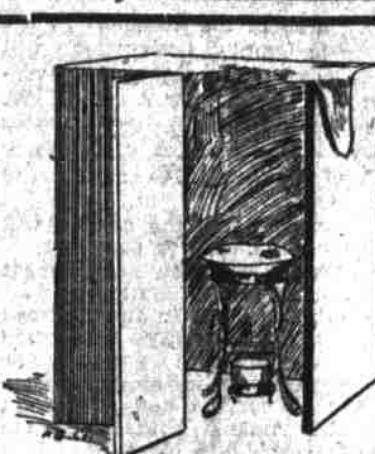

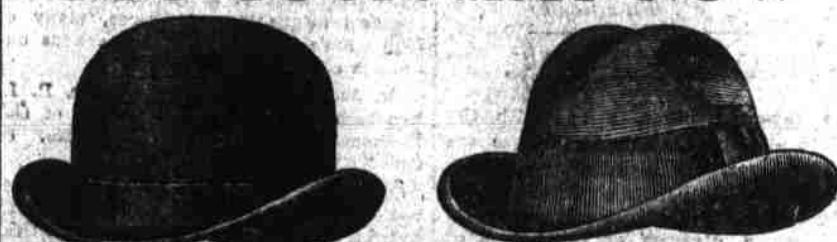
