

THE NATIONAL GAME BEGINS

New York and Philadelphia Start the Ball Rolling.

NEW YORK, April 17.—The race for the National League pennant begins today, and from now until the autumn winds begin to whistle about the bleachers the fans will have a plenty to keep them guessing.

While the conditions surrounding the opening of the season for the old and honored organization might be of a roster type, still, all things considered, there has been a lifting of the cloud during the last few weeks, and the magnates expect to see a bright horizon.

At the Polo Grounds the Giants lined up this afternoon against the Philadelphia. Tomorrow a return game between the two clubs will be played in the Quaker City and the following day the third of the series takes place here.

Brooklyn opens the season at home today in a game with the Boston. Pittsburgh plays at St. Louis, and Chicago at Cincinnati.

PROJECT NOT ABANDONED

It is reported now, however, that the Billings & Northern will be incorporated soon, to carry out this plan, construction to begin at an early date on the survey made by Burlington Engineers.

TO END WARS.

How Harry H. Hardinge Would Solve the Problem.

CHICAGO, April 17.—Before the Chicago Single-Tax Club Harry H. Hardinge declared that the United States was treating the Philippines as a "baiting ground," only more hypocritically.

"We are pretending to sympathize with freedom," said the speaker, "while we rob them."

Mr. Hardinge maintains that free trade would be an antidote for war. He said if the nations had removed taxes on Chinese goods and made such things as the Celestials desired the battle would have been won without firing a shot. The annexation of Canada could be achieved in this way, and all war is a thing of the past under the single-tax system, which made free trade possible.

CROWDS AT CHARLESTON

Not since the opening of the big fair have such large crowds passed through the throngs as were witnessed during the past few days. KAISER GOES SAILING.

ANOTHER UNION.

Steamboat Employees Preparing to Organize Soon.

A movement is on foot to organize another labor union in the city. Those who are at the head of it are the employees on the steamboats, and the men who are employed in the offices of the various transportation companies which have headquarters in Portland. In fact, included in the proposed organization will be all who are occupying the various positions in the steamboat business, from the deck hands to the ticket agents, if they can be persuaded to join. Employees in the offices are at the head of the movement, and one of them, in speaking of the matter this afternoon, said:

"All other classes of labor in the city

are better paid than we are, and it is high time that we were doing something to protect our interests. Our wages are barely sufficient to live on at the present high prices charged for the necessities of life. Rents and everything we buy have gone up to such an extent that they are out of all proportion to our wages, which have remained unchanged."

"When will this movement assume definite shape?"

"Just as soon as we can see the employees and talk the matter over with them. Of course there will be considerable preliminary work about the matter, but I think there is no doubt but that we will succeed in effecting an organization."

ADVANCE WAGES

MILBURY, Mass., April 17.—More than 1,000 hands are benefited by the wage advance at the Mancham cotton mills in Sutton, which went into effect today. The advance amounts to 10 per cent, and was made without demand from the employees.

REEVES' ANXIETY

CHICAGO, Ill., April 17.—Republican leaders are awaiting with considerable interest news of the result of the Congressional convention of the Twelfth district, which is in session today at Plano. Congressman Walter Reeves is a candidate for renomination and is opposed by Judge Charles E. Fuller, of Belvidere. The success of Reeves is generally predicted by those best acquainted with the situation in the district.

CARNEGIE IS A BRICK

Will Educate a Few Britons in the Ways of United States.

LONDON, April 17.—Friends of Andrew Carnegie who are scattered broadcast over England and Scotland are declaring that the American philanthropist will not permit Cecil Rhodes' magnificent bequest to the cause of Anglo-Americanism to remain a one-sided affair.

What Rhodes has done to insure the education of American boys in the greatest of English universities, they say, will be Carnegie's task to provide for English boys in some representative American university. They are even arguing pro and con between Yale and Harvard, while some say this is the one hint Carnegie needed to make perfect the national institute at Washington, which his munificence has made a certainty.

Mr. Carnegie's English friends point with exultation to reports just cabled from the United States that this hint has already been thrust upon him by the newspapers there, showing the faith which exists on both sides of the Atlantic that the multi-millionaire, who proclaims it a sin to die rich, will rise promptly to this emergency.

The cost of making Cecil Rhodes' scheme reciprocal—only \$100,000—won't cripple Mr. Carnegie's other philanthropic enterprises. He will still have millions left with which to found public libraries.

The extent to which this subject is now being discussed in London actually gives it precedence over South African war news in the popular mind. It is "Rhodes and Carnegie for Anglo-Americanism."

AMALGAMATED DIVIDEND

NEW YORK, April 17.—The much discussed annual meeting of the Amalgamated Copper Company is in session today. As the meeting is expected to act upon the dividend question, much interest is manifested in financial circles. The opinion prevails that a dividend will be declared, perhaps 1/2 per cent., but not more than 1 per cent.

Deputy Wardens Needed.

It is reported by two fishermen who were up the Clackamas last Sunday that on that day there were a dozen or more fishing nets being used in the river. They were worked up the streams during the day and allowed to drift at night. It is also said that below the Oregon City falls nets are being set in the river in broad daylight. These streams are supposed to be preserved against these unlawful practices.

It has been said that the Fish Warden should be more vigilant in the protection given the fish, and that the office of Deputy Fish Commissioner should be established in Portland for the accommodation of the people who wish to procure licenses. As far as the protection of the fish is concerned, many think that the Fish Warden is not doing all that he should in the matter. They say that in watching the fish hatcheries in the small streams, he is neglecting the work of protection of the fish in the lower streams.
