

FEAR DEAD

Woman's Sudden Death at Union Depot.

JUST FROM THE EAST

Took Ill as She Stepped From the Train on Her Way to Salem.

Mrs. Magdelena Stauffer, of Mon-roe, Green County, Wis., was suddenly stricken with heart failure at the Union depot, soon after getting off the 2:36 p. m. train yesterday, and expired in a few minutes.

Mrs. Stauffer, accompanied by her sister-in-law, Mrs. Elmer, left her home in Wisconsin a few days ago to visit her brother-in-law, who resides at Salem. When she got off the train she complained of her right leg hurting her, but nothing was thought of it, as she walked into the waiting room unaided and sat down.

In a few minutes she said she was dizzy and soon fainted. Mrs. M. E. Niles, the matron, and others hastened to her assistance, and simple restoratives revived the sick woman.

After resting a few minutes, she started to walk across the floor when she became unconscious and fell. After restoratives were again administered she opened her eyes and told those around her that she was going to die. Dr. Hubbard was hastily summoned, but Mrs. Stauffer became rapidly worse and died at 3:30 p. m., a few moments before the doctor arrived, who, after a hasty examination, pronounced it heart failure.

The deceased was quite stout, was 59 years of age, and apparently in good health. She was a widow, and is survived by six sons and three daughters, who live in Wisconsin.

Coroner Finley took charge of the body and it will be shipped back to her home. An inquest was deemed unnecessary.
