The conditions governing the real estate market are practically the same as those which have prevailed for a month. There have been no especially sensational features but a healthy tone is evident. Connce is gradually being restored, now that labor problems are all practically

At the southeast corner of West Park and Morrison streets a three-story building is to be erected. The old biuldings occupying this site are now being removed. The new building will have a o-foot frontage on Morrison and one of 60 feet on West Park. The property is owned by T. H. Bennett. As soon as the ground can be cleared of the present incumbrance, excavation will be gotten under way at once. When complete Mr. Bennett's new building will cost about \$20,000. This structure would have been started much earlier in the season had it not been for strike troubles. It is intended to have it finished within four months. The ground floor will be devoted to stores, and the remainder of the building to rooming-house purposes.

Excavation work for the Portland Generał Electric Company's new brick building on Alder street is nearly completed. When the building is finished it will add greatly to the appearance of the corner of Seventh and Alder. The basement to the building will be much deeper than is usually the case, and it will include within itself the power room of the company, which is now in the old building along-
