SALEM BRIEFS.

SALEM, July 28.—The Union Light & Power Company, of Woodburn, which has a power station at Silverton, where its power is secured from a fall, artificially made in Silver Creek, has brought an injunction suit against John Lichty, owner of a saw mill, to restrain him from operating a flood dam above the dam of the power company. The petitioner alleges that the flood dam of Lichty, when closed for two days in order to accumulate water to make a drive for its logs down from the mountains, interferes with petitioner's business, stopping its plant for want of water, and thus doing the company irreparable injury. The petitioner further asserts that Lichty proposes, is not restrained, to raise his dam to a height of 75 feet, and it is feared if such a volume of water would thus be accumulated, were released, it would sweep away the petitioner's entire plant.
