Serious Trouble at Primaries in New Jersey.

ONE MAN KILLED IN CAMDEN

Joe Goddard, the Pugilist, Was Shot by a Constable.

J., July 29.—Primaries for the election of delegates to the convention of the First Congressional district of New Jersey were held yesterday, and proved to be the most bitter on record, several serious collisions occurring. Henry C. Loudenslager, the present Congressman, and T. Alphons Vansant, the candidate for the nomination, have from the first conducted their campaigns with much acrimony, which resulted in a free fight from the time the polls opened at 8 o'clock till they closed at 8.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The ranch of Mrs. Nancy Irving, near Grand Junction, Col., was visited by 12 masked men on Sunday night, who with clubs and knives, threatened 500 Angora does, causing a loss of \$3000. This is the result of a cattle-sheep war. Alfred F. Cunningham, known as the "King of Chicago Counterfeiters," has been arrested. He had a complete outfit, and several sacks of bogus half-dollars when taken. John Rosene, of Chicago, with nearly 100 American miners, has sailed from Nome for Siberia on a mining expedition. Rosene holds a concession from the Russian government. The Supreme Court of Washington has decided that homesteads granted to Indians under the act of Congress of July 4, 1884, are not subject to taxation for 25 years. Nebraska, Western Iowa and South Dakota were shaken by earthquake shocks yesterday afternoon for about 20 seconds. No damage has been reported. Harry De Windt, of the London Times, who has just reached Seattle from a six months' exploration of Siberia, reports that a transcontinental railway to Asia by way of the Behring Straits is a feasible project. An unknown woman, fashionably dressed, was found strangled to death in Henry O'Hara's saloon in a low district of Chicago last night. James Grant and Edward Goff, who were seen in her company earlier in the night, have been arrested. Edward A. Cudahy, head of the Cudahy Packing Company, of Omaha, dejectedly reports that his concern was to be absorbed by a packing house combine as "a myth, pure and simple." Governor Orman, of Colorado, has offered a reward of \$1000 for the capture of the four robbers who held up the Denver & Rio Grande train near Marshall Pass on July 24.

Cooper, general agent of the passenger department of the Rock Island, has returned from a week's sojourn at Spokane and the cities of Puget Sound. B. H. Trumbull, commercial agent of the Illinois Central, got in last night from a trip to Spokane, where he was accompanied by Jay W. Adams, of the Nickel Plate at San Francisco.
