WEATHER FORECAST.

The sale of stamps and stamped paper at the Portland Postoffice for July amounted to \$23,664.31. For the corresponding month in 1931 sales were \$20,824. The excess for July, 1932, over July, 1931, is \$2,839.31.

F. B. Reeder was given a Deputy Sheriff's commission, but no pay.

H. B. Miller, consul at Nui Chwang, China, will return home next month. He has been granted 90 days lay-off and will probably make Portland his home.

Judge Jas. A. Wayne, of San Francisco, was in the city a few hours yesterday on his return home from a two-weeks' trip through Crook County. He was accompanied by Benton Kilian, the attorney, and C. C. Hutchinson, president of the Oregon Irrigation Company, and together examined some 400,000 acres of arid land in the Deschutes Valley with a view of its possible reclamation by irrigation.

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FIGHT FOR SPEAKER

Of the Oregon House of Representatives.

IT GETS INTERESTING

Davey, of Marion; Harris, of Lane; Eddy, of Tillamook, Are Candidates.

A very interesting fight is on for the speakership of the next House. There are three candidates in the field—Frank Davey of Marion County, L. T. Harris of Lane and B. L. Eddy, who has the joint interests of Yamhill and Tillamook Counties in his care. Davey is a newspaper man at Salem and had the distinction of leading his ticket at the election. While it appears he is making some effort to be known at the next session as "Mr. Speaker," his candidacy is not really being considered seriously and it is believed he would be perfectly willing to draw out of the main contest if assured first place on the House committee of ways and means. The real fight will be between Harris and Eddy. Both were members of the House two years ago; both were personally active in everything they undertook and before the session of 1931 was much more than half over it was apparent that Harris and Eddy were always in evidence when any measure of importance was under consideration and generally on the same firing line. Both are well thought of and have many friends, but the chances of success seem to favor Eddy, it being claimed that he has received assurances of a sufficient number of the house members to make his election a certainty.

RUMP CAUCUS?

While it is probable that the majority in both branches of the Legislature will go into caucus on organization, it is by no means certain that there will be anything more than a rump caucus held when it comes to choosing an United States Senator. It will require 47 Republicans to hold a binding caucus and the precedent set by Senator Fulton and his followers at the last session will likely be followed next winter. During the entire session of 1931 Senator Fulton was able to keep a sufficient number of Republicans from participating in a party caucus to prevent any choice for United States Senator being made that would be considered binding. Time and again the effort was made to reconcile differences, but availed nothing. The refusal of Fulton and his followers to enter the caucus brought about the defeat of Hon. H. W. Corbett and the election of John H. Mitchell. Now Fulton as a candidate for the Senate will find it difficult to bring into line the needed number of Republicans to make a binding nomination for United States Senator. His political chickens of 1931 will be found coming home to roost in 1933, disarming him of all argument in favor of a party caucus—tossing him as it were on his own petard.

A CONTESTED SEAT.

For the first time in many years in the history of the Oregon Senate there will be a contest over a disputed seat. In the June election Percy Kelly of Albany was the Republican nominee for the Second Senatorial district, which comprises Linn County. His Democratic opponent was Milton A. Miller of Lebanon, was elected by the small margin of two votes. Kelly has served four years as Senator and was particularly desirous of retaining his seat in the Senate, as it gave him considerable party prestige among the Linn County Republicans. Senator Kelly two years ago was one of the supporters of Fulton for the presidency of the Senate on condition that J. H. Finch, one of his leaders, should be given the place of calendar clerk of the Senate. Finch had been, previously to the campaign of 1930, notoriously a Populist and a bitter opponent to the Republican, but Kelly had used for him and in the vernacular of the street, a clinch. In order to keep Kelly in line, Finch was given the clerkship, despite the protest of several Republican Senators, and Kelly's colleague in the Senate, Clem, a Populist, refused to vote for him.

WHAT DEFEATED KELLY.

This action on the part of Kelly contributed more than all else to his defeat last June. He lost a number of Republican votes through such action. Now it is reported Kelly expects to be seated anyway, relying more on securing enough votes to depose Miller than upon the election returns and the certificate of election which his Democratic contestant holds. Miller certainly has the best of the fight. He has the seat and it is not believed that a sufficient number of Senators can be induced to unseat him in favor of a Republican, simply on party lines alone. Some flagrant error in the count of ballots must be exposed before Miller can be ousted. He and his numerous friends in Linn County are confident that he will retain his seat, even if, as reported, a disposition is shown to deprive him of it by unfair means. It would be a bad precedent to establish and a majority of the Senators would be extremely wary of becoming party to a scheme that would savor of political jobbery.
