VISITS EDWARD

German Kaiser Sails for
Cowes.

(Journal Special Service.)
BERLIN, Aug. 2.—Through the visit
of Emperor William to King Edward is
declared to be without political signifi-
cance. It is nevertheless attracting con-
siderable attention in view of the inter-
change of courtesies which has marked
their relations for some months past.
The Emperor sailed from Kiel today on
board the Imperial yacht Hohenzollern.
He is expected to remain at Cowes
through the regatta week, when his
American-built yacht Meteor III will
compete for the King's cup.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT.

The Lewis and Clark Civic Im-
provement Association met last night and
elected Thomas McCusker president,
vice F. H. Gibson, resigned.

The feature of the evening were the
remarks of H. Wittenberg in which he
scored the City & Suburban Railway for
obstructing Third street, between Flan-
ders and Gilsan, for the past few weeks
because of making repairs which he
said could have been made in one week.
This compelled people living on the East
Side to walk fully one block in making
transfers. He also said that the com-
pany was violating its charter in the poor
service it furnishes the East Side and
for not running street cars on the streets
and bridges in South Portland on which
it has franchises. This granting of
franchises to companies that do not run
cars on the streets franchised is an in-
fringement on the rights of the public.
The secretary reported that upon re-
quest of the association the Board of
Health has filed a cesspool on Mill
street with broken stones and the Port-
land Railway Company had removed
some obstructions on Chapman street.

JULY AN AVERAGE MONTH.

Prophet Beal's meteorological summary
shows that July, 1902, was about the av-
erage and little else, despite the theories
of many people that it was an unusually
warm July. We did miss but a little on
rain, but that's about all.
Out of 31 possible days of sunshine,
there were 18 clear, 7 partly cloudy and 6
cloudy days. As to winds, the maximum
velocity was 29 miles an hour on the 15th
from the southwest.
The mean temperature for the month
was 65 degrees, the average for the past
32 years being 67. The total precipitation
was 1.75 inches, the average for the past
32 years being .58 inches. The highest
temperature was 85 degrees on the 19th
and the lowest 46 degrees on the 7th.
