He stated further that he did not authorize Lavigne to make the match and desired the public to know that he was his own manager.

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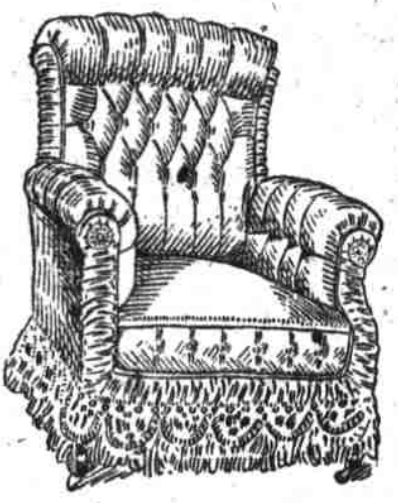
