The British bark Routenburg, Captain Roberts, has arrived and is anchored in the stream. The captain, three mates and an apprentice are British subjects and they will come ashore today to celebrate coronation day.

The damages sustained in an accident by the steamer Bailey Gatzert last week have been repaired and she will go back on her regular run tomorrow. A new engine has been installed, the boat has been otherwise improved, and she will go back into service as good as new.

The British ship Star of Germany has arrived at East London, South Africa, after a passage of 120 days from the mouth of the Columbia. This is a month longer than is usually required to make the voyage. Her bulwarks were considerably damaged when she reached her destination.


