ELK'S CONVENTION STARTS BUSINESS

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 12.—This was the opening day of the great national gathering of Elks, and if the enthusiasm that attended the initial proceedings is any indication of what is to follow the convention is destined to go down in the history of the order as the most successful yet held. There was a delegation on hand from every state when Grand Exalted Ruler Charles E. Pickett called the gathering to order this morning in the assembly hall of the Mormon tabernacle, the interior of which was gay with the flags and banners of the order. The opening proceedings were routine in character but none the less in-

teresting. Governor Wells extended greetings on behalf of the state of Utah and there were other welcomes for the city, the local lodges of the order and the business men of Salt Lake City. Response was embodied in the annual address of the Grand Exalted Ruler and then the convention listened to reports and the appointment of committees. This business disposed of an early adjournment was taken to permit the visitors to partake of the first installment of the long and attractive entertainment program prepared by the local committee. THREE GIRLS SLAIN BY INDIAN WARRIOR

DARLINGTON, O. T., Aug. 12.—Hated for the white race, conqueror of his own, strangely masked with a pretense of love—that has cost the lives of three white women at the hands of White Buffalo, an Indian medicine man of the Arapahoe tribe.

He has confessed that he murdered them, and is in jail at Darlington, Okla., awaiting the formality of a trial before paying the penalty of his crime.

White Buffalo is a typical Indian brave, with intelligence far above the average of his tribesmen. He was educated at the Carlisle School, leaving there and returning to the Cheyenne and Arapahoe agency at Darlington in 1888. Tall, lithe, powerful, White Buffalo was a handsome brave. There was about him, too, something occult and there are those who believe now that he possesses a hypnotic power.

Certain it is that White Buffalo had a marked attraction for the pretty paleface daughter of John Andrews. One day the pretty paleface strangely disappeared. The agency turned out and searched the wide prairies for her. She had been seen last mounted on her pony and riding over the reservation with White Buffalo. It was late in the evening. The medicine man said that she had

A few months later White Buffalo became the devoted lover of Annie Dennis, another white girl, whose father was employed at the agency.

One evening they strolled around the agency in the twilight. That was the last time Annie Dennis was seen alive. The next day her body was found. She had been slain with a knife thrust into the heart. Again suspicion pointed to White Buffalo, but again there was not sufficient evidence to hold the mysterious medicine man.

A few months later he captivated the heart of Maude Ellis, the daughter of an agency overseer. One day his sweetheart accompanied him on a walk of several miles. At night White Buffalo returned alone. On his hands were telltale spots of blood. He was arrested, and then the medicine man confessed that he had cut the girl's throat, and that innate hatred of the paleface had led him to kill her.

With that confession came another. He admitted that he was the slayer of Margaret Andrews and Annie Dennis.

WHERE CORONADO GAVE UP HIS SEARCH FOR THE CITIES OF GOLD

(Journal Special Service.)

JUNCTION CITY, Kan., Aug. 12.—On the site where Coronado turned back to Mexico after his fruitless search for the seven golden cities in the province of Quivira a handsome monument was unveiled today. The purpose of the monument is to commemorate the discovery of Kansas by Coronado and the rediscovery of the site of Quivira by J. V. Brower, of St. Paul, Minn. The location of the monument is at Logan's Grove, a short distance from this city.

The erection of the monument is due to the efforts of the Quivira Historical Society, which was organized at Alma, Kan., last October. The society is composed of archaeologists, historians and students and its membership extends over a number of Western states. The officers, nearly all of whom took part in today's ceremonies, are Prof. J. V. Brower, St. Paul, president; Prof. E. E. Blackburn, of the Nebraska Historical Society, vice-president; Prof. E. A. Killian, Alma, Kan., secretary, and Judge John T. Keagy, Alma, chairman of the

executive board.

The monument is a handsome shaft of polished granite, standing on a base of rough stone. On the face is the following inscription:

"QUIVIRA AND HARAHEY, DISCOVERED BY CORONADO, 1541. JARAMILLO PADILLA TATARAX, RE-DISCOVERED BY J. V. BROWER, 1896. ERECTED FOR QUIVIRA HISTORICAL SOCIETY BY ROBERT HENDERSON 1902."

The unveiling exercises were of an extremely interesting character and were witnessed by a large throng. The ceremonies began at 10 o'clock this morning with an offering of prayer, after which there was an address by Mr. Brower reviewing the history of the movement culminating in the erection of the monument. Other addresses of an historical nature were delivered by N. H. Winchell, president of the Geological Society of America, Prof. E. A. Killian and others. The music for the occasion was furnished by the regimental band from Fort Riley.

KANSAS GIRLS ORGANIZE A FARM HANDS' STRIKE

WICHITA, Kan., Aug. 12.—Three young women—Rose and Agnes Kilgore and Miss Alexander—are responsible for a harvest-hand strike in Pratt County, when 300 quit work, leaving 25 farmers stranded for help in the midst of their wheat harvest.

The girls had been working in the fields themselves and they complained of ill-treatment from several of the farmers employing them. Long hours was the cause of their quitting work. Three

young men, their sweethearts, were discharged at the same time for trying to organize the farm hands and raise wages on the farm.

This enraged the girls and they commenced getting young men to quit work and join their forces, until 300 were members of the Pratt County Farm-Hands' Union. The girls ordered a strike yesterday and the members all quit.

No outside workers are allowed to come in the place. A party of workmen from Wichita was run out of Pratt.
