Motor and Cycle.

At the new open-air bicycle coliseum in Philadelphia, Howard Freeman, the Oregon boy, defeated Lloyd McFarland in a 20-mile motor-paced bicycle race. Freeman won by 10 yards. Time 31:13.

S. E. McCallum, of Minneapolis, has started to ride to Regina, N. W. S., and return, on a motor cycle. The trip is one of 1800 miles.

An automobile reliability test will be made on October 9. The run will be from New York to Boston and return. Entries of all different kinds of machines and different fuel burners will be made.

EXCITING FIVE-MILE RACE.

Football Notes.

Benjamin Andrews, chancellor of the University of Nebraska, and ex-Superintendent of Chicago schools, thoroughly believes in football as part of the necessary education of young men.

"If I had 100 or 200 children, I would want every one of them to play football if they were strong enough, and to play if hard and strenuously," said Chancellor Andrews, in a lecture at the University of Chicago. "Boys ought to be trained in strenuousness," he said. "That is the great value of football: it is a school in which courage and resolution are taught. I thoroughly believe in the game."

NORTHWEST GAMES.

Captain J. H. Jones, of the Washington Agricultural College football team, and J. Lasher, the quarterback, are in Spokane conferring with Coach Allen in regard to the coming season's work.

"The men will all be at school promptly at the opening," said Mr. Jones. "The fall term will begin about the middle of September and active practice will begin at once. TO JAPAN

Colonel Dosch Will Go There

REPRESENT OREGON

At the Japanese National Exposition to Be Held in Osaka in 1903.

"I am going to Japan now to do promotion work for the Lewis and Clark Fair," said Colonel H. E. Dosch this morning to a Journal reporter. "Yes, I will do promotion work there and prepare the diplomatic way so that they will put up a fine exhibit here in 1905. I will leave here on September 1st, as that is the time the earliest steamer for Japan leaves, and will arrive there on the 16th."

Questioned as to whether he is acquainted with any of the officials in Japan, the Colonel replied: "I am pretty well acquainted with the high officials over there as I met them at various exhibitions. I am very well acquainted with Marquis Ito. You see, I will get the necessary space for the Oregon exhibit at their exposition and find out what kind of an exhibit is best to send there. When I have done this scouting work, I will return to Portland, prepare the display and then go back to Japan. I expect to return to Portland from my first trip by the middle of October."

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DECKHANDS ACT

Report that They Will Refuse to Handle Boycotted Fuel.

It is reported that the deckhands on the Vulcan, belonging to the Jones Towing Company, refused to handle the Bandfield-Vesey slawwood the other day, and the boat had to proceed down the river with barely enough fuel to take her to the first wood camp where she could take on an unboycotted supply. The full truth of the matter cannot be ascertained before the crew returns.

The Jones Towing Company has four boats, the fuel for which has always been procured from the Bandfield-Vesey Company. If all the deckhands have gone together for the purpose of forcing the owners to get their fuel at other sources, the unions believe that they will be sufficiently strong to accomplish that end. It will mean a big victory to the Band and Fuel Teamsters, and they are feeling jubilant over the report.
