

LIVE CAMP

Bohemia Surprises Its Best Friends.

MUSICK AND HELENA

Champion Mill Nearly Done—Others Running and the Camp a Regular Beehive.

(Journal Special Service.)
BOHEMIA, Aug. 18.—It is a great surprise to all visitors of the Bohemia mining camp to see the amount of development work going on and the activity of the camp, as compared with any previous year of its existence. Last year there were less than 200 persons in the camp at one time, very little work being done and the stages empty half of the time, while it is very difficult to secure passage either way unless one makes arrangements several days ahead, some thousand or twelve hundred people are in camp and more coming at the time.

The music mine is making music with its ten stamps and continual blasts of dynamite. The post office is crowded every mail night. The old Nott property is being extensively developed, preparatory to installing a large plant of machinery this fall or early next spring.

The Helena, with its 10 stamps, is a veritable bee hive and pounding out its record as a continuous dividend payer. For 25 consecutive months previous to June, 1902, it paid a half cent dividend and for June is paid one and a half cents.

Helena No. 2 is doing a large amount of work and getting out ore enough to keep the 10 stamps engaged by Contractor Morphy, hauling until the rains make the roads impassable. This short season transportation scheme will soon be overcome by the advent of the Oregon & South Eastern Railroad, which is making rapid progress to reach its terminal point at the very doors of No. 2.

The Champion ten stamp mill will soon be in operation. This is a new \$5,000,000 company, and comprises the Helena Consolidated, Musick and Calapooia Mining & Tunnel Companies.

Adjoining the Helena property is another fine proposition. It is the LeRoy Company, with splendid property well located and well managed. It is being thoroughly equipped with necessary machinery to expedite the work of pushing their tunnel into the richer ores.

At their recent meeting they advanced their stock to 15 cents per share. This is good news to all the stockholders, and is giving much needed encouragement to the camp and other companies.

The Crystal Consolidated Company's property lies west of the LeRoy, and is making rapid progress in opening up their promising claim near the lake.

The manager, Frank Jordan, has gone to San Francisco to secure a five-stamp mill to be placed on his claim. Only a short time since they opened up a very rich body of ore and feel justified in taking this step.

The North Fairview Company have nine claims in this same locality, are pushing work and expect to make a mine during the season. A finer group of claims for location, timber, water-power and mineral wealth is hard to find in the district.

North and west of this group, having the same veins of ore as the Helena, LeRoy and North Fairview, is The Golden Rule Mining & Milling Company's group of six claims. This group is heavily timbered and extends down to Fairview creek. Some very high assays have been had from one of these claims.

From all indications this company will disclose a large body of high grade ore during the season's development on the Nomadic.

Another consolidation in this locality with some Eastern capitalists like the Securities Company would not only surprise the investors themselves, but would be a bonanza equal to anything in Bohemia, as it is in the heart of the camp and in a direct line of the richest mines.

S. J. Brund has another desirable group of claims on the west slope of Elephant Mountain. He has spent several thousand dollars on this property, and will reap the reward of the persistent prospector.

A little further to the west is located the Hiawatha and Judson Rock groups. These are already incorporated into stock companies and are making a meritorious showing. Their stock is selling fast, and the price is advancing very rapidly.

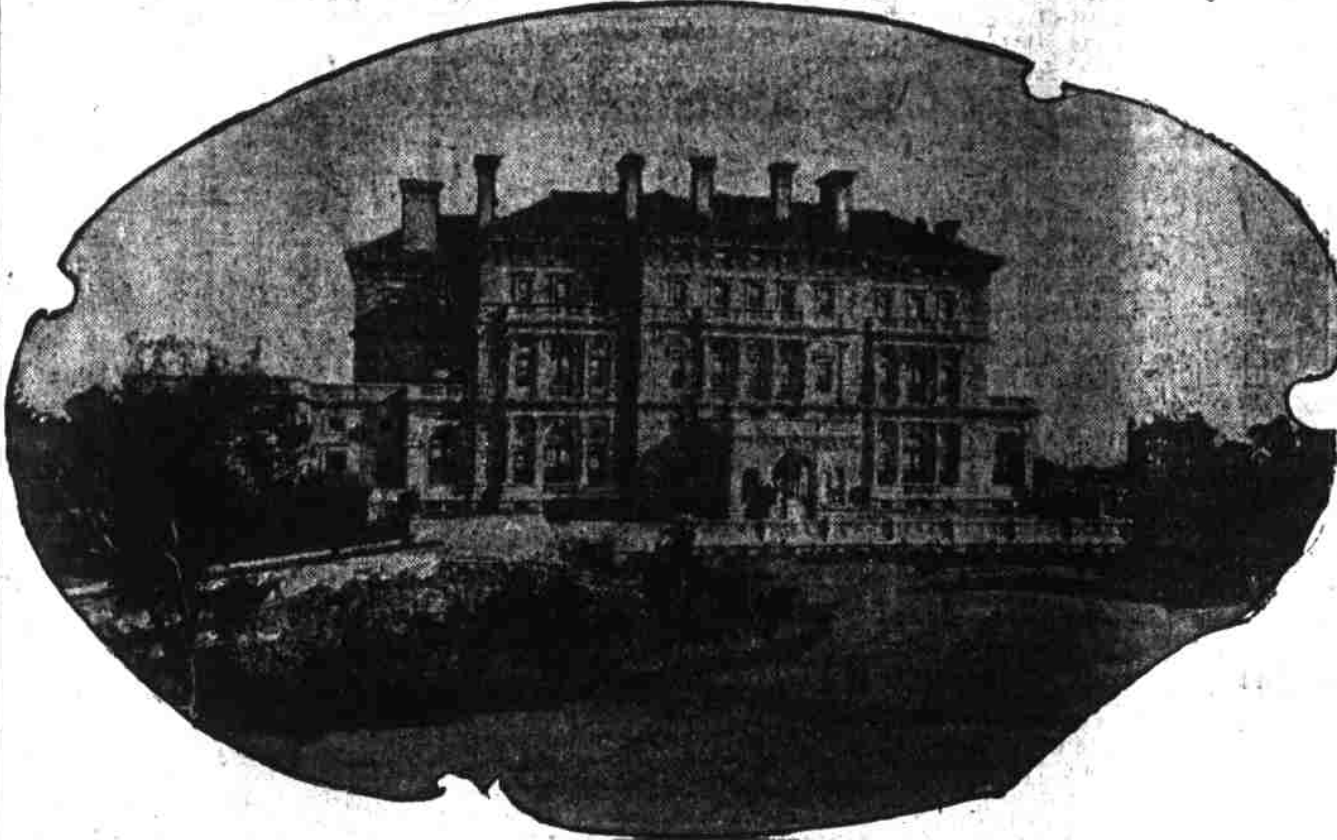
HIS PRAYER WAS ANSWERED

TEDDY'S HOME TOWN AS IT LOOKS TO A MAN OF THE WOOLY WEST

OYSTER BAY, L. I., Aug. 18.—W. E. Sleeper, of Sunshine Ranch, Big Horn County, Wyo., who visited the President Saturday, is now on his way home, a happy man. He traveled 125 miles on horseback to reach the railroad station, then took a 300-mile journey on the cars before reaching the President, and at the end of his tiring trip came within an ace of not seeing the Chief Magistrate. He was helped out by the newspaper men, who went to Secretary Loeb in his behalf and told that it would be an outrage to deny Sleeper an interview after he had traveled so far and had spent so much time and money for the sole purpose of shaking hands with the President and giving him a petition drawn up by the cattlemen of Wyoming. Sleeper saw the President, was treated very cordially by him, and better still, was given the assurance that the forest reserve law, which threatens to work a hardship to the stockmen, will not be enforced during the present season.

"If I had gone back to Big Horn County without seeing the President," said Sleeper, "I would have been killed, that's all there is to it. The boys would have thrown a lariat around my neck and dragged me to the borders of the county with instructions not to come back."

"You ought to have seen the enthusiasm of the mass meeting that we held

in the Gray Bull Club when we drew up the petition. In the first place, though we had to get the boys together and that wasn't any easy job. They were scattered over the range for a couple of weeks. After they got together in about three days. Then it took just 15 minutes to draw up the paper and raise \$500 to bring me here. I told the President that if the law was enforced this year and all the stock was driven off the ranges included in the scope of the act, hundreds of stockmen would go to the poor house."

"I'll be dead glad when I get back home. This part of the world would kill me inside of a month. I visited my old home at Burlington, N. J., the other day, and found that the only change that had taken place in the last 17 years was a new coat of paint upon the Presbyterian Church. And this place, Oyster Bay, is the limit of civility. The hotel here has had a \$5,000 hotel, and when you ride to the hotel from the station you go in a rubber-tired carriage behind a pair of horses that every one can't drive. You ought to have seen the creature that pulled me from the railroad station here. In our country it would have been shot long ago."

LION SWINGS HIM NOTABLE ORATORS

A Hammock Experience That Was Not Appreciated.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 18.—Animal Keeper Hill of the Wright Carnival Company, which had an engagement at Rochester, had an exciting experience with a lion while on the way to this city.

Hill stays in the animal car while on the road and at night sleeps in a hammock, which is suspended from the roof of the car. Monday night he went to sleep as usual, but, as the night was very warm, he left the door of the car partly open.

AUGUSTA, Me., Aug. 18.—Chairman F. M. Simpson and his aides of the Republican state committee have completed all arrangements for beginning the state campaign next Monday. Besides President Roosevelt, the speakers to be heard during the three weeks prior to election include a dozen United States Senators and almost as many members of the lower branch of Congress. The list comprises Senators Gallinger and Burnham of New Hampshire, Lodge of Massachusetts, Burton of Kansas, Dooliver of Iowa, McComas of Maryland, Mason of Illinois, Spooner of Wisconsin, Dillingham of Vermont, and Representatives Burckett of Nebraska, Foster of Vermont, Currier of New Hampshire, Pearce of Maryland and Landis and Watson of Indiana.

In addition to these named Senators Hale and Frye and Representatives Littlefield and Powers, all of this state, will take an active part in the campaign.

BAD IDOLS

Europe Supplies Africa With Strange Gods.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18.—European enterprises are furnishing Africa with its heathen idols! It is an actual fact that the hideous images which the African savage worships are now being made at factories in England, at Nimes in France and at Gries in Germany. The firm that deals in these strange gods has its headquarters at Zanguebar, where it does a thriving business. The natives pay for the European-made gods with ivory, palms, maize, nuts, gold and cattle. They pay at the exorbitant rates, too, which the white man has always exacted from the unsophisticated savage. The merchandise paid for a single god varies in value all the way from \$250 to \$500.

The tribes of the Senegambian district in Africa, particularly, believe that they propitiate their gods by having their images made in rich metals. A chief will readily pay 500 barrels of palm oil, worth \$125 a ton, for a fetish in the shape of a gold monster with a fenshish head or for a serpent with three heads affixed to a long pole of ivory.

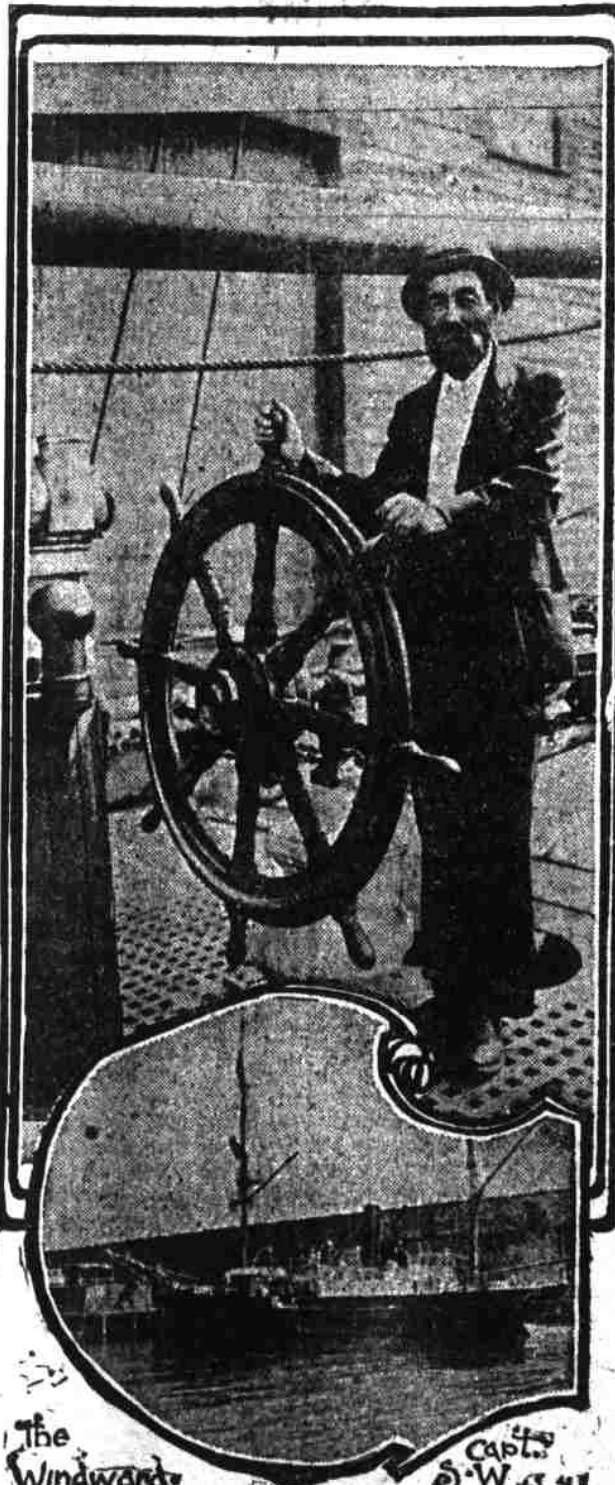
