GARDNER WINS FIGHT

Root Knocked Out After Desperate Battle.

(Journal Special Service.)
SALT LAKE, Aug. 19.—Last night, Jack Root, the prize of Chicago, went down and out before George Gardner in the 15th round.

Both men went in to win. It was an even match throughout. Both were in the best of condition and put up the fight of their lives.

The contest was remarkable for its speed and the punishment received by both fighters.

Gardner played for Root's stomach, his weak spot, and continued to rain blows in that locality until Root was literally beaten down.

Root shattered his left hand in the second round, and was unable to use it to advantage during the remainder of the battle.

In the seventh round both men had an eye opened by some vicious uppercuts and blood freely.

In the 13th and 14th rounds the fight looked like Root's. He came up strong and administered severe punishment to Gardner.

In the last three rounds Gardner started in and finished his man by slugging. He made no effort to defend himself, but mixed things up. Root made a game stand, but could not hold up under the fierce pounding.

The men weighed in at 155 pounds. The betting at the ring was 10 to 7 on Root.

The Carter-Ryan fight will take place at Fort Erie, on September 15. The purse will be for \$500 and the gate receipts.

Sam Harris, McGovern's manager, has \$10,000 to wager that his man will defeat Corbett.

The Romance Athletic Club, of San Francisco, will open tonight with a bout between Dutch Thurston and Young Gibbs. Kane and George will go 10 rounds and Johnson-Bennet eight.

Tim Kearns of Boston and Eddie Cain of Brooklyn have signed articles for a 15-round go before the club that will put up the best purse.

Pittsimmions is rehearsing in a play called the "Honest Blacksmith." Robert is the star. The play will open in San Francisco.

POLICE COURT SCENE

LABOR NOTES.

H. G. Greene, business agent of the Building Trades Council, reports that everyone in the building line is busy.

The Federal Labor Union of Troutdale has sent word that it will attend the Portland Labor Day celebration in a body, and take part in the parade.

The Laundry Workers will go on a river excursion to Lady Island next Sunday. The Harvest Queen and Kleikittat burge have been chartered for the occasion. Music and dancing will continue all day.

N. Anderson, business manager of the Laundry Workers' Union, has received notice that ex-Mayor Chase of Haverhill, Mass., will deliver a lecture in Portland, September 27, on the labor issues of the day. Mr. Chase is an orator of national renown, and efforts will be made to have a big crowd out to hear him.

G. Y. Harry, president of the State Federation of Labor, will leave this evening for a trip up the Willamette Valley to organize new unions. He will visit McMinnville, Independence, Dallas, Corvallis, Sheridan and a number of other towns. He expects to be absent about 10 days.

W. O. Powell, delegate to the Laundry Workers' International convention which was held in Philadelphia, sent a telegram to the local union yesterday stating that he had been elected president of the international organization. This is the first time that a Pacific Coast man has ever been honored with a position on the executive board. Mr. Powell will return home the latter part of this month.

The Laundrymen's Association met last Tuesday and the members decided that they would close their places of business between the hours of 9:30 a. m. and 2:30 p. m. The employees did not like this plan, as they desire the entire day to themselves. They met last night and so expressed themselves in the form of a notice which was sent to the association. "It is a national holiday," they argue, "and we do not intend to work. It may cause some friction between our employers and ourselves, but it is not likely that it will be more than temporary."

GEER GLAD

To Appoint Dosch Our Special Agent.

Henry E. Reed, secretary of the Lewis and Clark Centennial, received the following letter from Governor T. T. Geer this morning:

"My Dear Sir: Answering yours of the 15th inst., I desire to say that I have today made out Mr. Dosch's commission as representative of Oregon to Japan in the interest of the Lewis and Clark Centennial. No better man for the work could have been selected."

"I also acknowledge with pleasure the formal invitation to be present at the laying of the corner stone of the monument to be erected in honor of Lewis and Clark. I desire to add, however, that if I am to be present as Governor of Oregon there will have to be some 'hurry up' work done, since, through no fault of mine nor of the people of the state, the close of my term of office is rapidly approaching."

"Anything I may be able to do toward furthering the interests of the Lewis and Clark Centennial I shall regard as a pleasant duty."

Colonel Dosch has already received credentials mentioned in the above letter.
