The grain market is unchanged. Calcutta bags have declined about 25 cents the past few days, there being a large stock on hand, and the season closing shortly.

A quantity of the famous Hood River apples are in this morning and bring the top market price. The supply of other fruit and vegetables is equal to all demands and prices are easier. Peaches are a shade lower.

Yesterday there was an advance on the coffee exchange in New York of 25 points on all Brazilian grades of Rio and Santos, owing to a report of a heavy frost in Brazil, which hurt the flowering of the new crop.

Jobbing trade holds up quite well, and lumber is used as day, as the pressure continues in Portland, the largest amount in the history of the city, and the mills are all busy.
