"This recollection of General Riley's," said Major Burke to The Journal, "reminded me that without being elected, I have occupied the Presidential chair. I was naturally surprised. President Arthur then requested me to sit down in his chair temporarily while he conversed with Senator Squires. Thus I sat in the chair which is so eagerly contended for. So you see I fulfilled my grandmother's wishes and hopes."

"This what I will tell you happened in 1859 in Virginia City, Nevada. BREEDS DISEASE

Decayed Vegetation and Refuse Matter Strawn on the Waterfront.

There are many places about the city which demand the inspection of a health officer. It is perfectly nauseating walking along certain sections of Front street, on account of foul odors arising from refuse matter and decayed vegetation thrown there by careless merchants from many of the big commission houses. Occupants in some of the flats also add materially to the unpleasantness of the situation by dumping out all kinds of garbage and waste matter from rear doors and windows.

Travelers going to the boats and others having business down that way are making strong complaints against the accumulations of filth on every hand. Large fruit stores, situated near the river, have been so long accustomed to making the river bank a dumping ground for all of their spoiled produce, that they would be surprised if it should be intimated to them that they are doing anything wrong. This work has been going on with impunity, so residents in the vicinity say, for years. As a consequence those employed constantly around the docks, are unwell much of the time and frequently have attacks of malaria. One of the dock employes was seen last evening making an attempt to gather up garbage which had been thrown on the slip or incline driveway, and he was asked how it got there.

"It came from these big business houses on Front street," he replied. "Anything that is in an advanced state of decomposition and cannot be sold, finds its way here. We try to keep things cleaned up, but it is impossible. No wonder there is so much sickness down here. This foul air is enough to kill a person. See all that stuff back of that building? You can smell it if you can't see it. People room there and everything that they wish to get clear of, goes out at the back windows. But this decayed fruit and vegetation along the sides of the driveways come from the stores. No one says anything to the proprietors about it and they will never stop the practice until they are forced to do so. There is only one clean and respectable looking dock down here, in the business part of the city at least, and it is kept so by the vigilance of the employees who will not allow anything to be dumped there. That company employes its men with the understanding that a portion of their duties will consist in preserving a tidy appearance to the dock.

"All of the companies, of course, ought to do the same thing, but they would not be obliged to go to this unnecessary trouble and expense if the ordinance covering this matter were strictly enforced. Until it is, there will always be considerable sickness here during the summer months."

Company Now Working Lucky Queen, Which Has a History.

The Lucky Queen has an interesting history, and has been abandoned and re-located a number of times. It was worked 25 years ago, and is the oldest quartz mine in the country. About 10 years ago an Eastern company bonded the property and began extensive work on it. When the time for a payment came due the owner of the claim was paid off with

nothing more substantial than a plausible excuse. This continued for an indefinite period and the owner, who was one of the original locators, became exasperated beyond all reason, and a shooting scrape ensued in which two men were killed.
