OLD MAN SAVES BOY

But Is Nearly Killed Himself While Making the Effort.

MURPHYSBORO, Ill., Aug. 22.—P. J. Keller, a gray-haired farmer, who lives near here will probably lose his life as the result of rescuing Frank Underwood 5 years old, from the path of a freight train.

The baby was playing on the track near the station when a Mobile & Ohio fast freight appeared, coming down the high grade into town. Keller knew that the child did not realize his peril and rushed to save him just as he picked the boy up the train struck him, hurling him both to the side of the track. Keller received injuries from which it is said he cannot recover. The child was badly bruised.

The wholesale dealers are experiencing a period of activity. Produce in all lines are steady in prices and demand. There is good outlook for a complete clean up of perishable goods and only a very small stock will be carried over.

The fish market is very active, with prices steady and a big business being done. The dealers report a most satisfactory condition.

Eggs are quiet with a tendency to stiffen a little in price as the week closed. Only occasionally are they sold for 9 cents and then only in large lots.

The wholesale grocery dealers report a steady market and a good volume of business. Sockeye salmon have advanced 20 cents per dozen 1-lb. cans and 10 cents per dozen 1/2-lb. cans.
