weather. It is not intended to intimate that our quadremania knows any more than, or even as much as Uncle Samuel's weather forecasters, but we present his opinion for what it is worth. He has had a pointer from the weather bureau, as follows:

WEATHER FORECAST.

Showers and thunder storms have occurred in Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, eastern Montana and the Dakotas.

It is decidedly warmer in northern Minnesota, North Dakota, Manitoba and northern Utah, and cooler in northeastern Washington and eastern Montana. Elsewhere the changes in temperature have been unimportant.

The indications are for fair and cooler weather in this district Sunday.

Western Oregon—Fair tonight and Sunday; cooler north portion tonight, except near coast; northerly winds.

Western Washington—Fair tonight and Sunday; cooler tonight, except near coast; northerly winds.

Eastern Oregon—Fair tonight and Sunday; cooler.

Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho—Fair tonight and Sunday; cooler south portion tonight.

Southern Idaho—Fair tonight and Sunday; cooler west, warmer east portion tonight; cooler Sunday.

JAILER JACKSON AND HIS WARDS

Has 56 Prisoners on His Hands—Jail in Excellent Shape.

The county jail of today and what it was a short time ago presents a far different aspect. Jailer Jackson had a fresh coat of paint put on the floor yesterday and this about completes the renovation of the county bastille. The ceilings have all been replastered and the walls kalsomined. In the corridors a liberal supply of whitewash has been used, and at the present time the jail has not the repulsive appearance of such institutions generally.

There are now about 56 persons confined in the jail, half a dozen "hops" sends being received yesterday morning as follows: May McMullen, G. H. Smith, C. Fane, like Grubbe and Fred L. Jones. They will all "do" 25 days for either having opium in their possession or smoking it.

Grubbe is in a very bad condition physically, through disease, and Jailer Jackson has communicated with the county physician. The latter will probably send the prisoner to the county hospital.

GOOD ROADS TRAIN

May Come to the Pacific Coast in October.

Assistant Secretary Reed, of the Chamber of Commerce, has sent letters to the Chambers of Commerce of Seattle and Spokane, requesting them to petition the Great Northern Railway to send their "Good Roads" train to the Coast in October.

The Chamber of Commerce has also interested President Mellen of the O. R. & N. Company and W. E. Coman, General Passenger and Freight Agent, who are also using their influence in this direction.

The general opinion seems to be that the Great Northern will be only too pleased to accede to the request.

INSPECTION

Of Pest House and Poor Farm.

MAYOR AND AUDITOR

They Are Pleased With the General Conditions at the City Establishments.

Mayor Williams and Auditor Devlin visited the pest house, poor farm and city crematory yesterday. As the poor farm is a county institution, the city officials carried no authority with them but simply made a social call on Superintendent Hansen. The visitors were much pleased with what they saw, and express themselves as being convinced that there is very little room for improvement in the home for the county's indigents.

The water supply for the city pest house, which is located near the poor farm, was the primary reason for the visit of Messrs. Williams and Devlin. Speaking of the matter this morning the Mayor said:

"From my observations I am satisfied that both the pest house and poor farm should be supplied with Bull Run water. The city is willing to stand half the expense of supplying the two places with good water. We simply looked the field over but will take no immediate action in the matter. In regard to the pest house, I will say that more buildings are needed as the room is entirely inadequate."

"I was much pleased with our visit to the crematory. No more garbage suitable for burning is now deposited on the dump. The smoke is either consumed or so heated that it no longer bears an offensive odor. On my first visit I found things far different."
