LOCAL MARKETS.

Markets are active this morning, with a slight tendency to weaken at the closing day of the week. Demands are equal to the supply today, but there seems to be an over stock in tomatoes.

In the groceries and provisions the weak has been very good. The country is in a healthy condition and merchants are keeping their stock well in hand. The lumbering, stock and farming sections are in a most prosperous condition and the demand from these sources is increasing.

The farm produce market is a little bare owing to the demand upon all lines. California, Crawford peaches are coming in rapidly. The stock is in good shape to go over and all produce will close at fair prices except in tomatoes.

Chickens are a little weak this morning, while eggs hold about the same. There will be a clean-up in all lines today and the local markets can look for a fresh supply on Monday.

Flour is on the verge of weakening, as the country mills are beginning to start. The brans and middings are a little weaker on this account, and there will be a greater reduction in prices next week.

The hide and wool market is quiet but steady. Salted hides are, quiet and have maintained an average standard for the week.
