WEATHER FORECAST.

Showers and thunderstorms have occurred in Montana, the lower Missouri Valley and in Northern New Mexico. The weather is cloudy and somewhat unsettled in Eastern Washington, Northern Idaho and in extreme Northeastern Oregon. Dense fog prevails on the Oregon and Washington coast.

It is warmer in Nevada, Southeastern Washington and Northern Idaho and Northeastern Washington. In the Pacific Coast states west of the Sierra Nevada and Cascade Mountains the temperatures are from 3 to eight degrees below the normal.

The indications are for fair weather in this district Wednesday, with moderate temperatures.

Western Oregon and Western Washington—Fair tonight and Wednesday; northerly winds.

Eastern Oregon—Part cloudy and threatening tonight; cooler; Wednesday, fair, cooler.

Eastern Washington and Northern Idaho—Tonight and Wednesday, partly cloudy and occasionally threatening; cooler; south portion.

Southern Idaho—Tonight and Wednesday, fair.
